about them. Some men might be surprised if they knew how many were saying that they have a yellow streak. Some men might be surprised to know that others are saying that they are staying out of the home guard because they are afraid that they may be called into danger—because they have not enough red blood in their veins to stand up to the music—that they haven't the backbone to face danger—that they have dishrags where backbones should be and are afraid to get into something which might result in their clothes becoming soiled or their perfect coiffure becoming slightly disarranged.

Some women and girls would be surprised to hear what others of the city are remarking about them because they make no exertion to perform Red Cross or other patriotic work, evidently fearing that the overexertion will tire them or that they will have to inconvenience themselves slightly.

It is hard to say who are slackers and who are not, but it is the duty of every man, woman and child to do all he can to advance this great world war. If you can look into your heart and take account of what you are doing and not feel certain that you are doing your full duty—if you have time that you could give to some war activity and are not doing so, you can feel pretty certain that many are calling you a slacker.

When the boys come home from Europe they will want to know what you did for them while they were away.

Here's a test every man, woman and child of reasoning age should put to himself:

When the boys come home, can I hear them tell of their sufferings and privations and feel that I did my little here while they were doing so much over there?

When I hear them tell of crawling through mud and hell with bullets whistling above them, can I look back and not feel ashamed of the little part I played while they were playing so big a part in the world's greatest war?

When I hear of the things they did without having the opportunity to offer the excuse that they were busy, or tired, or wanted to see a friend, or wanted to make up lost sleep, or wanted to go on some pleasure trip, will I feel satisfied with what I have done, or will I look back upon hours idly whiled away while I might have been doing something to aid them in their noble work—will I feel like sneaking away into some corner that they may not see the blush of shame upon my face?

When they tell of going over the top into what seemed certain death, what will they think of me if they learn that I was afraid to join the home guard for fear of getting my clothes mussed or for fear that I might be called where an L. W. W. bullet might tickle me in the ribs?

Men and women, when these battle-scarred, sun-bronzed veterans come home and tell of the things they have done for you, are you going to feel worthy of participating in the things they have saved for you?

Young women, are you going to feel that you are worthy to be the wives and sweethearts of such men?

This is an age for men and women with red blood in their veins, with a full sense of their duty, and a willingness to perform it.

We at home do not have to fight; we do not have to die.

Our sons, or the sons of other parents, our brothers, or the brothers of others, do. A Lane county boy's name appeared in the list of killed in action this week.

What are you doing? Are you a slacker or a patriot?

It may be left to you just now to judge whether or not you are performing your duty, but remember that men and women who are doing their duty are not talking kindly of those that aren't and the time is close at hand when the person who is not performing his full duty to the best of his ability will lose the entire respect of his fellowmen.

This is no time for mincing words. This is a time for action. If the sentiments herein do not suit you, the chances are that you should take every word to heart, that you should let them burn into your mind and heart and stir you to action.

Ask yourself what the boys are going to think and say of you when they get home. Then get in and get busy.
