AWFUL SLAUGHTER OF GERMAN SICKENS BRITISH GUNNERS

(Continued from first page)

As that wave of Germans, a solid mass, came across the land between the British and German trenches, the heavy guns of the British opened on them. They had but to fire. They could not miss the enemy. The Germans sank to their death by thousands before those guns. But the war-mad managers behind them had planned for just such a slaughter of their own men. With the death struggles of the first wave of Germans, came a second, uniforms new, hearts beating fast and brains borne up with the stimulus of rain and ether. They, too, went down before the terrific fire of the same British guns.

The third wave of men came and the third wave of men died. Thousands more came in the fourth wave, and were piled dead above the bodies of their comrades.

So it went, wave after wave, the German generals determined to make "the kaiser's own battle" a victory by wearing out the British guns with German human flesh.

The British gunners actually became heart-sick with killing the poor beings who marched to their death on the orders of their own cruel generals.

When the ninth wave of men had come and died, the cannon in the first line of British defense became so hot that they could not be fired any more. The gunners took off the breech locks and retired to the second line of defense.

On came the tenth wave of Germans, there to meet the fate of the nine that had gone before. On came others, sacrifices to the will of an autocracy determined to fasten on the rest of the world the same militarism that made these subjects give up their lives.

But the German generals had more men to feed into the barrage of the second line of British guns, and fed them; fed them until more British gunners were sickened by the sight and fired more from duty than hatred—except such hatred as must arise in men with red blood and hearts of human beings for generals who will make such a sacrifice of human life.

So human flesh wore down more steel, men paid the toll with their lives until more British guns became too hot to be fired. Wave after wave and column af-

ter column perished before defense after defense. Stalwart men brought from the Russian front, old men forced into the service, mere boys in their teens; gave up their lives to the god of war; militarism was showing off at its best and worst.

At a terrible cost of life human beings wore down the last line of British defense and troops shattered and weary, but still buoyed by remaining effects of the stimulants bore on to the west, even past Albert, and dangerously close to the coveted goal, Amiens.

And there they were when we reached that city on the fifth day of the battle, the day of great slaughter, the day on which it seemed to many that they might succeed, but the very day on which they were stopped in the open. With the effects of the ether and rum gone, weary and worn, the men who had passed trench and cannon and entanglements were brought to a halt, where there were no entrenchments. There they were held, held until reinforcements could come, held by the valiant British until the brilliant French troops could reach them.

Let us pause here for a thought. If the German generals and the German military party will sacrifice their own men as they surely did sacrifice them to gain a point in strategy, what would they do to America and our allies if they should gain a final victory in the war? We should think of this when it comes to aiding our government and the auxiliary workers in their efforts to carry on the struggle to a right victory, to a right and lasting peace.

MAN BORN AND RAISED IN GERMANY TELLS WHY HE'S AN AMERICAN

Brutality of the Soldier Was Practiced Upon Civil Population of Own Country Before the War.

The Seranton, Kansas, Gazette prints a speech made in that town by one Herman Wilks, German-born, which is worthy of wide circulation as a patriotic declaration. The speech follows:

"I know Germany; I was born there. I went to school in the fatherland; and let me tell you, my good German friends here tonight, you do not know what you are telling about when you support German autocracy. If you are honest about it you will say that you and your fathers fled from Germany, just as mine did, to escape military tyranny. I know Prussianism. You may have been born elsewhere in the empire, but the brutal iron heel of the government that has drenched this whole world in its war for world power was the same power that made every German who had a little cottage or mud hut, no matter how poor he was, to board a German soldier free of charge. That soldier was the autocrat of that home. His word was law. If he punished a child or knocked him from a chair to the floor the father must smile. To resent the action of the brutal guest, who must have the best of everything in that house, was to bring dire punishment upon the head of that family. There was a filled knapsack hanging upon the wall and a loaded gun in the corner, and when a call of war did come that soldier with 150 others knew just where to run in order to form a company ready for immediate service. That is a type of the German organization for you. What I have said cannot be denied.

"Let me tell you something else. I have been asked so many times how can the German people, who are generally so peaceful, have changed into such murderers? I tell you that for years and years there has not been a minister standing in the pulpits of Germany but what has been selected by the government. Approved by the powers, he has never preached to the people without combining the name of kaiser Wilhelm with God Almighty. The people have had it preached to them. It became a part of their religion. God has given them the kaiser. It is a part of their training as well for not a school teacher or instructor in the schools of the fatherland but what is subject to the approval of the German government and the children are taught that Germany must lead the world, that their kaiser and their God are inseparably connected. I tell you that the German people have had so much of this doctrine that they really believe what they have been taught and cannot escape from the virus.

"My own mother carried me in her arms. She knew what military tyranny was, for she suffered until we came to the land of the free to live under God-given stars and stripes. Often have I heard her say in heart-broken anguish over the safety of her brothers who fought in the German legions, 'O why is it necessary for a people to fight and keep great armies when all could be so happy?' Her brothers were killed in battle, but our love went out to this great country of freedom which has blessed the world and which is ours today. How happy would she be were she only here now to know that three sturdy grandsons are in the service ready to follow Old Glory to a greater sphere of freedom than the world has ever known. They have taken a solemn vow to follow our flag until it floats in triumph over Dresden, if need be. And their march, my friends, won't be the march of the Germans through Belgium, with its blood and tears, for they will say to the German people, 'Come, my brothers, into the enjoyment of the fruits of a great freedom of the world democracy that knows no divine right of kings and that shall mean for all peace and happiness. We come not to rob you of your land, or your money, or to enslave you, but to bring you in larger measure that message which the angels sang out on old Judea, peace on earth, good will to men.'
