SUMMARY OF THE SUGAR REGULATIONS IN EFFECT IN OREGON

City householders may purchase but two pounds of sugar at a time for domestic use.

Rural householders may purchase but five pounds of sugar at a time for domestic use.

Per capita consumption for everyone is limited to three pounds per month.

For canning purposes a family may purchase on certificate 25 pounds of sugar at one time. An additional purchase may be authorized by state or county food administrators if the need for it is shown.

Manufacturers and eating house establishments may buy sugar only upon presentation of certificates from the state food administration issued through the respective county administrators. Amounts permitted these users vary according to groupings just made.
