### MY FOUR YEARS IN GERMANY, BY GERARD

Famous Film at the Eugene Theater Tonight and Tomorrow.

The long expected and probably the most important film production of the year, made from Ambassador James W. Gerard's famous book, "My Four Years in Germany," comes to the Eugene theater, at Eugene, Friday and Saturday, July 26 and 27, direct from a sensational run at the big Coliseum theater at Seattle where, during its two weeks' engagement, it was shown to over a hundred thousand people and shattered every attendance record for a picture in the northwest.

The picture begins with the Zabern incident, the cutting down of a lame shoemaker by a young Prussian officer, then follows Gerard's presentation at the imperial German court, the gradual rise of the spirit against militarism, the defiance of the reichstag, the shooting at Sarajevo, the Kiel celebration in which the British fleet participated, the meeting of Sir Edward Goschen and Holweg and the proposal that England stand by while France is beaten, the announcement of danger of war on July 31, the ultimatum to Russia, Gerard's futile efforts to avoid the war, the order to mobilize, the address of the kaiser on August 4, the rape of Belgium, the taking over of the British embassy by Gerard, the exodus of Americans, the kaiser's explanation of the war, so different from that of von Bethmann-Hollweg, the scene before the Japanese embassy, the cruel treatment of prisoners in camps, the attacks of the press on America, the sinking of the Lusitania, President Wilson's notes, the unrestricted submarine warfare, the kaiser's threat that he would stand no nonsense from America after this war, the Fryatt shooting, the Roger Casement incident, the deportation of Belgian women and children, the dinner to the Ambassador so soon to be followed by the break of relations between America and Germany, Mr. Gerard's detention as a virtual prisoner, his return and America's answer to the kaiser in the troops going over the top, and the armies over there.

**How To Develop Good Teeth**  
YOUR teeth need exercise daily. By exercising daily, by masticating the hard and rougher sort of food they can best be kept in condition. Hard crusts and other coarse and fibrous foods which require thorough chewing before they can be swallowed, are especially good, not only for children but for adults also. It helps to produce a good circulation of blood and in children develops the muscles and expands the jaws, so that room is provided for the incoming larger teeth. Children should be allowed to eat only at regular hours. A child should be taught to chew his food very thoroughly.  
Proper training and care of the teeth in childhood establish habits they will appreciate in after years. A few minutes longer with the tooth-brush each morning and night—a visit to a good dentist at intervals—will save lots of unnecessary pain and avoid poor health which will surely follow neglect of the mouth and teeth.
