PRIVATE LESTER SANFORD DESCRIBES SINKING OF THE TUSCANIA

Cottage Grove Boy "Keeps His Head"
and Doesn't Even Get Feet Wet.

Lester Sanford, a private in Co. D, 6th Bn., 20th Engineers, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Sanford, of this city, writing to his mother from Castets, France, under date of June 11, describes his experience on the occasion of the sinking of the Tuscania as follows:

"We were off the coast of Ireland and in plain sight of land all day, and felt mighty good because we were so sure of reaching shore safely. Some of the boys even had their packs made up, as we expected to reach port at 8 o'clock the next morning. The light-houses along the coast were beginning to light up and I was just going upstairs to wash up for mess when there was an awful sound on the boat. I dropped everything I had in my hands and grabbed my life-belt just as the lights went out. We had a hard time getting up from below. The boat listed to starboard and there was an awful rush of cold air. We soon reached the upper deck, where boats were being lowered, though this was difficult owing to the boat's list, and many were thrown into the water. It looked pretty tough to me, so a boy friend named Glassby and myself decided to remain on board and wait until help came, and it is lucky we did, as only about two boat loads were picked up from the sea. We waited 2 hours and 15 minutes after the boat was struck before we were taken off. A destroyer came along the port side and the boys slid down ropes to her deck. Presently another, 'H. M. Pigeon,' came alongside our starboard and Glassby and I slid down a rope to her deck without even getting our feet wet.

"The 'Pigeon' beat it for the Irish coast and we were taken off in small boats. We were tired, cold and hungry, but were given a warm meal and a good bed. I shall never forget how the Irish treated us. They are the finest people on earth.

"I recently had a letter from 'Poely' Milne over here. I saw by the paper you sent me that they were here, so I wrote him. 'Dutch' Brumfield is in Co. D, 10th Bn., 20th Engrs., and is pretty close to us, but I have been so busy that I have not written him yet."

In a letter written from the same place, under date of June 24, to his sister, Mrs. C. W. Lebegood, who is stopping with her parents here, Mr. Sanford says that all of the boys have gained from 10 to 25 pounds, that he is in the 25-pound class himself, that he works 57 hours a week and eats enough for three men, and that France is the most beautiful country in the world.
