## WHAT LIBERTY BONDS WILL BUY FOR ARMY

- 1 \$100 bond will buy overcoats, slickers and blankets for 2 soldiers and mess kits for 15.
- 2 \$100 bonds will buy 5 complete rifles with bayonets, 1 automatic pistol and 250 rounds of ammunition.
- 3 \$100 bonds will buy 6 airplane demolition bombs (the kind dropped on munition factories and dumps, trains, stations, etc.) and 24 signal flares.
- 4 \$100 bonds will buy 29 airplane incendiary bombs.
- 5 \$100 bonds will buy 30 airplane fragmentation bombs (the kind dropped on masses of troops), and 11 hand grenades.
- 6 \$100 bonds will buy 10 airplane flares (each of which will light up 4 square miles of ground at night).
- 7 \$100 bonds will buy a trench knife, steel helmet and 1 day's rations for 216 men.
- 8 \$100 bonds will buy mess kits, canteens and entrenching picks for a company.
- 9 \$100 bonds will buy harness for the wheel horses of 4 artillery teams.
- 10 \$100 bonds will buy each man of a company 9 hand grenades, 9 gas or phosphorus grenades, or 8 rifle grenades.
- 1 \$1000 bond will buy 1 loaded 16-inch shell.
- 1 \$1500 bond will buy one of the effective little 37 mm. cannon used in the trenches for breaking up enemy strong-points and machine gun nests out of range of trench mortars.

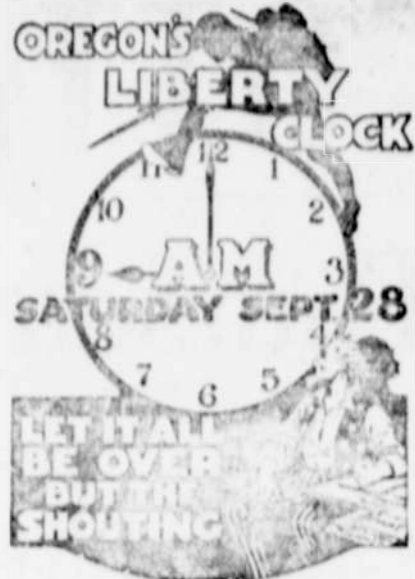

## FARMERS URGED TO BRING IN THEIR BEST GRAIN

Farm Crops of All Kinds Are Desired  
at Lane County Fair.

Attention is called by H. C. Wheeler, of Pleasant Hill, superintendent of the grains and grasses department, to the premiums being offered by the Lane county fair board for good farm crops.

Nothing adds to the attractiveness of a fair exhibit like a good display of farm crops, says Mr. Wheeler. The fair board realizes this and has practically doubled all the premiums for this class of entries. People in the past, says Mr. Wheeler, have not given this class of exhibits the attention they deserve, and he believes in a year like this farmers should make a special effort to help make a good creditable exhibit at the fair.

"Our crop production is not only the most important line of agricultural production in the county, but is the very

foundation of our farming industry," said Mr. Wheeler. "If more attention were given to growing better varieties and exhibiting the same at so generally a patronized public institution as the fair, it would mean a great deal in stimulating our production of better yielding varieties of crops."

"The government is asking for the largest harvest the world has ever known in 1919, and it is to be known as the liberty harvest. A good exhibit of threshed grains will not only show the varieties adapted to this county, but would also serve to show where good seed could be obtained for next year."

Mr. Wheeler says, "Let's start this liberty harvest with a good display of crops at our fair this fall."

## Plan Slacker Round-Up.

Aberdeen, Wash., Aug. 29.—Chief of Police Dean today announced that a clean-up of slackers is to be started here as soon as federal government orders giving special power to police in dealing with slackers arrive.

"The local housecleaning will include slackers of all kinds," said Chief Dean.

"Deserters, men who have never registered, men who have evaded draft calls, evaders and violators of the work or fight order, of whom there are many in the city, and men of draft age who are on jobs women ought to be holding. There will be a special effort to round up loafers and men not working in essential industries."
