Mother of Soldier in France Says Boys at Home Just as Necessary as Those Over There.

Mrs. Jean Morris Ellis, member of the war council of the spruce division gave an interesting address at the Christian church Sunday evening upon the work of the department. Speaking as the mother of a boy already in France, she appealed for support of the boys in the spruce camps who are doing a work just as necessary as that of the boys in the trenches. Without their work the boys in the trenches would be helpless, she said, and most of them are only in the spruce camps because they were sent there when they really wanted to go across.

Only the fact that having a son over there prevents her acceptance for overseas service has kept Mrs. Ellis in America.

## MONROE COMPLIMENTED BY EASTMAN COMPANY

The definition and composition of the picture are both good and we feel that you are to be in every way congratulated with the results."

The picture shows Mr. and Mrs. Slagle comfortably ensconced at home and was taken with a flashlight apparatus invented by Mr. Monroe and used exclusively by him.

## NO PHEASANTS UNLESS PROTECTION IS GIVEN

No game birds are going to be furnished communities where ample protection is not given in the closed season, according to Game Warden Shoemaker, who was in the city Saturday. He reported that at Eugene there are a number of sportsmen who know of 40 China pheasant chickens being killed by one hunter, yet none of those who could testify are willing to do so. Conditions are bad in that vicinity, especially in the Oakridge neighborhood, according to the game warden. He expressed himself as well pleased with the method used here for propagating the game birds and was high in his praise of the use of game preserves upon which no hunting is permitted at any time of the year. He expressed the hope that no poaching would be permitted and that the game warden would see that all violators of the game laws are summarily dealt with.

Mr. Shoemaker was accompanied by I. N. Fleischner, of Portland.

## 500 QUARTS FRUIT AND JAM FOR SICK SOLDIERS

About 500 quarts of fruit and jam will be sent to the soldier boys who are in the hospitals as the result of service for their county. Over 450 quarts have been collected and are now at Red Cross headquarters awaiting shipment. It is thought that that not yet delivered will bring the total up to 500 quarts.

### Z. T. Foster Dies.

Z. T. Foster, who had been seriously ill for a number of months with a complication of diseases, died yesterday morning. If a son, Tom, who lives at Deer Island, is able to get here by that time, the funeral will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Zachary Taylor Foster was born at Fairview, Pa., November 10, 1849. He went to Wisconsin in 1851 with his widowed mother, four brothers and four sisters and lived there until 1908, when he came to Cottage Grove. He was united in marriage to Miss Allie E. Decker April 6, 1881, at Stone Bank, Wis. Besides the widow the following relatives survive: Three sons, K. Roy, of this city; Tom D., of Deer Island, Ore., and George D., who is with the 4th engineers in France; two daughters, Mrs. F. M. Chapman and Mrs. G. L. Allen, of Divide, Ore., and a brother, H. D. Foster, of Manistee, Mich.

### 65th in New Quarters.

Letters received here from France under date of August 25 state that the 65th artillery had arrived at its permanent winter camp from which it will be sent to the trenches for service and then back for rest.

This regiment is composed largely of the men who formerly composed the coast artillery corps and has many Cottage Grove boys among its members. Prior to moving to the permanent camp the regiment was stationed at La Cour, time, where it was engaged in training. One letter stated that the boys traveled two days and nights in a box car which bore a note that it had capacity for 8 horses or 40 men. During the journey the men were fed upon corn beef hash, canned tomatoes, beans, bread and jam.

## HEIRS OF W. H. ABRAMS IN SUIT AGAINST WIDOW

The case of Minnie S. Howard and others against Mrs. Alice Faskett was heard before Judge Skipworth Monday. This is a case wherein Mrs. Howard and other children of the late William H. ## RULING ON FEEDING WHEAT TO BE MADE

Several farmers have made inquiry as to whether or not it is permissible to feed to their chickens wheat that they themselves have raised. So far as the Sentinel knows, the food administration has made no definite ruling upon this point and the observance of any ruling made would be purely voluntary upon the part of the farmers. The farmers of the Cottage Grove country would, no doubt, observe any wish of the food administration and The Sentinel has word that something definite upon the subject will be issued within a few days. The same will be published in The Sentinel as soon as issued. Meanwhile it would be well for farmers to use extreme caution in feeding any wheat that might be used for feeding the boys and our allies overseas.

### Clothing for Belgians Wanted.

Lane county is asked to contribute five tons of old clothing this week for the relief of the Belgians. Used garments for all ages and both sexes are needed. Garments need not be whole but must be clean and durable enough to be worn or made over. The work in Cottage Grove is in charge of the Red Cross.

## COURT HOUSE ADDITION READY FOR OCCUPANCY

The new addition to the Lane county court house is nearing completion and it is expected that some of the office rooms will be occupied by the first of October. Judge G. F. Skipworth, of the circuit court, has announced that the regular term of his court, which convenes October 21, will be held in the new circuit court room in the addition. Sheriff Elkins plans to occupy his new quarters, at present occupied by

the clerk's office, by the first of the month, and Clerk Russell will move into the present office of the sheriff, also into the new vault rooms in the new addition.

E. J. Moore, county school superintendent, expects to be able to move from his rooms down town to the new building October 1, and it is probable that District Attorney Ray, who also occupies rooms in the business district, will be able to move about that time.

### James Allen Is Injured.

James Allen was badly injured in an accident at the Rujada logging camp Tuesday. A log swung around against him and he sustained two fractured ribs, a sprained ankle and other injuries. He was brought here Wednesday.

### Ambulance Corps Soon at Front.

The ambulance company that was recruited in Eugene, and to which a number of Cottage Grove boys belong, is probably now at the front. H. R. Knight, of Eugene, has received a let-

ter, from his son Harry, who is a member, in which it was stated that all their surplus belongings had been taken from them and stored, that they had no clothing left except what they wore and one change, and their extras of all kinds had been taken. He expected that the corps would move at any time.

### Hail to the Pioneer.

An all day meeting of the pioneers association will be held back of Skinner's butte just north of Eugene on the first Saturday in October. Attendance is not restricted to pioneers alone. Everyone is welcome. All are requested to bring song books containing patriotic songs and participate in stirring musical program. Anyone is eligible to membership who came to Oregon prior to 1865, or natives having lived in the county for 50 years.
