A state election is to be held upon November 5, although the amount of interest being taken might indicate that the idea of voting upon that day is the last thing the people are thinking of.

That is a dangerous condition for the people to get into.

That is the reason that there are two candidates upon the republican state ticket who, in the primary election, defeated candidates far more worthy.

Two more such mistakes should not be allowed to happen on Tuesday, November 5, but they are likely to happen unless the people as a whole go to the polls.

Voting is not only a privilege—but a solemn duty.

At this time it is a duty second only to support of the war.

There are two state offices in danger. One of those is the governorship of the state. The other is the United States senatorship.

Governor Withycombe has made a better record as a war governor than The Sentinel had ever hoped for.

He has been an outstanding American at all times. He has never hesitated when a test of patriotism came.

The Sentinel did not support him in the primaries because it thought another man would make a more ideal governor, but as between Governor Withycombe and his opponent we have no hesitancy in saying that the present executive should be retained.

Personally we like Walter Pierce, but as chief executive we prefer one whose upstanding Americanism has been tried and not found wanting, who has never been even accused of flirting with the socialistic, industry-destroying Townley Non-partisan league. It is now no time to change a well-broken horse for a prairie mustang.

As between Senator McNary and Ossie West, we do not see how the voters can hesitate. Senator McNary has made a most remarkable record during the short time he has been at Washington. He has voted right. He has worked as he voted and his ability is such that his work has been a great support to the administration. Placed beside the erratic Ossie, there is nothing to it.

Besides, it must be remembered that this is not only a case of changing horses in mid-stream. It is a case of sending to Washington a man who is going to have a part in the reorganization of the country after the war. We must look forward to that. We can not live in the present only. After the war we must have the steady influences of republican principles. We do not want to repeat past experiences and that at the most dangerous time in our country's history.

We want a safe and sane man at Washington when level heads are needed. McNary is the man for that job. Ossie West positively is not.

And don't forget this: Ossie West and Walter Pierce are hustling for votes while Governor Withycombe and Senator McNary are sticking to their posts. Ossie and Walter were out hustling while the Liberty loan drive was on, and they were doing this despite the fact that the administration had asked that politics be adjourned and that no other activities be carried on during the drive.

The republican candidates have served the administration far better than those who would displace them.

This is a good time to keep on the job men whom you know can be depended upon, and the only way to do that is to be at the polls on November 5. The other fellow is likely to be. Be sure that you are.
