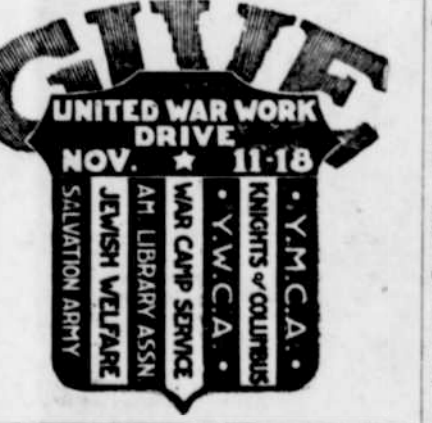

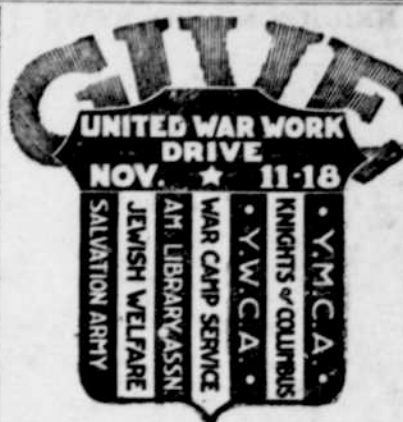

GRAIN YIELD IN COUNTY HEAVIER THAN LAST YEAR

The threshing report of Lane county, as requested by the government, has been completed by N. S. Robb, county agricultural agent, and forwarded to the department of agriculture. The report shows that in 1918 there were 19,193 acres of wheat planted, as compared with 15,000 in 1917. The yield of grain for 1918 was 199,500 bushels as compared with 190,750 in 1917. These reports were collected from 54 threshermen over the county who were furnished books by the department of agriculture, through the local county agent, and contained reports of over 1500 farmers.

The request for an increased winter wheat acreage is going to show up fine in Lane county, Mr. Robb believes. The county was asked for a 15 per cent increase of winter wheat by the government, and this will be exceeded this year.
