Children's Eyes Are Often Defective from Birth

A serious problem that confronts parents is to know whether or not their children's eyes are normal. Quite a large percentage of school children are handicapped by defective vision without the parents being aware of the deficiency in their eyesight. This condition is sometimes indicated by backwardness in their studies, nervousness, or a general lack of interest in their work.

THEY SHOULD HAVE THEIR EYES TESTED

For the welfare of the child it is very important to have their eyes examined before school begins, or before their eyes are overtaxed by their studies. If taken in time, children frequently outgrow this trouble entirely, when neglect may result in a general breakdown of the whole nervous system.

A SIMPLE TEST WILL DETERMINE
