WAR SAVINGS STAMPS TO BE SOLD IN 1919 SAME AS IN 1918

Definite announcement of Oregon's 1919 War Savings stamp quota will be made at the twelfth federal reserve district conference, to be held in San Francisco on January 17 and 18. Preliminary arrangements for the national campaign are being made at the conference now in session at Washington, D. C.

Word has already been received that the national quota is to be \$2,000,000. On this basis it is expected that Oregon's quota will be identical with that of the past year, or \$17,253,740. The 1918 quota was fully pledged, but the percentage of failure to redeem pledges leaves a deficit of from \$700,000 to \$800,000.

The 1919 issue of War Savings stamps will have a face value of \$5, but will be of different color from those of the 1918 issue. They will bear 4 per cent interest, compounded quarterly. During January the purchase price will be \$4.12, with a one-cent advance each month until December, 1919, when the \$5 stamp will cost \$4.23. The maturity date of the new issue will be January 1, 1924. Stamps will be redeemable at postoffices after the required 10 days' notice.

The new issue will be exempt from all taxation except estate or inheritance taxes, surtaxes, excess profits and war profits taxes, and will be limited to individual holdings of \$1000 maturity value. Thrift stamps, bearing no interest, will continue to be issued in 25-cent denomination. Thrift stamps of the 1918 issue may be applied on 1919 War Savings stamps. A filled card of 16 Thrift stamps, plus 12 cents, will buy a War Savings stamp in January.
