MRS. LUCY LAWSON, 77 YEARS OF AGE, DIES FEW DAYS AFTER MOTHER, WHO WAS 96

Mrs. Lucy L. Lawson died at her home at Sutherlin, Oregon, Friday, January 10, at the age of 77 years, 5 months and 12 days, death being due to old age. Mrs. Lawson was born in Ohio. She removed with her parents to Minnesota, where, in 1868, she was married to Floyd Lawson. They moved to Washington, then to Cottage Grove, went from here to Canada, where they lived a number of years, finally returning to Oregon, making their home at Sutherlin. Mrs. Lawson was a firm believer in the Seventh-day adventist faith, having been a member of that church for more than 40 years.

The remains were brought to Cottage Grove Sunday morning and interred in the A. F. & A. M. I. O. O. F. cemetery, the funeral service being conducted at the grave by Rev. J. L. Beatty at 10:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Lawson leaves a husband, Floyd Lawson; one son, E. B. Lawson, of Sutherlin, and one brother, Clayton J. Root, of Rice, Wash.

Mrs. Lawson survived her mother, Mrs. Lavina McCall Root, only a few days. Mrs. Root having died at Mrs. Lawson's home December 20, her remains being brought here and buried beside those of her husband, who died here in 1905.

SURGEON GENERAL BLUE ISSUES FLU BULLETIN

Surgeon General Rupert Blue, of the United States public health service, has issued the following bulletin in regard to the influenza epidemic:

"Spanish influenza," "the flu," or "three-day fever," the disease now spreading over this country, is highly catching and may invade your community and attack you and your family unless you are very careful. Influenza is a crowd disease, therefore, keep out of crowds as much as possible.

Influenza probably spreads mostly by inhaling some of the tiny droplets of germ-laden mucus sprayed into the air when ignorant or careless persons sneeze or cough without using a handkerchief. Therefore, cover up each cough and sneeze. Influenza is probably spread also by the filthy habit of spitting on sidewalks, street cars, and in other public places. Therefore, do not spit on the floor or sidewalk. Influenza is probably spread also by the use of common drinking cups and the common use of towels in public places. Therefore, shun the common drinking cup and the roller towel in public places.

If you feel sick and believe you have Spanish influenza, go to bed and send for the doctor. This is important. All that has been said about Spanish influenza, is true also of colds, bronchitis, pneumonia, and tuberculosis. Do your part to keep them away.

NATIONAL PROHIBITION IS ACHIEVED; NEBRASKA IS 36TH STATE

Nebraska yesterday ratified the federal prohibition amendment, being the 36th and final state necessary to make the Sheppard measure, which outlaws liquor in the United States, the 18th amendment to the federal constitution. On January 16, 1920, every saloon, brewery and distillery in the country must close its doors and go out of business unless, as now seems likely, they are already closed at that time by war prohibition, which goes into effect July 1, 1919, and remains until the completion of demobilization.

Marion Owen Huff Dies at Dufur. Word reached here Tuesday of the death from influenza, at Dufur, in eastern Oregon, of Marion Owen Huff, second son of Mr. and Mrs. James C. Huff, former residents of this city. He was 22 years of age.

Both the James and Finley Huff families are down with the flu, with the exception of Finley. Upon receipt of the news, W. P. Huff, father of the men, and Mrs. Stinnett, mother of Mrs. Finley Huff, left immediately to assist in caring for their relatives.

P. P. Davis Dies at Lorane.

P. P. Davis, a pioneer of this section, died at his home at Lorane Friday night, January 10, of apoplexy. The funeral was held at the grange cemetery Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock.

Mr. Davis was born in Indiana and came to this country 55 years ago. He was 73 years, 9 months and 28 days of age.

Surviving relatives are the wife and five children. Two of the children, Mrs. Percy Rogers and W. H. Davis, reside in this city.
