MRS. WHORTON, PIONEER OF '64, DIES AT DORENA AT THE AGE OF 86 YEARS

At the home of her daughter, Mrs. J.
L. Willets, at Dorena, on Wednesday,
January 22, occurred the death of Mrs.
Nicy Jane Whorton, at the age of 86
years, 1 month and 16 days. The funeral
service yesterday afternoon was con-
ducted from the Mills chapel in this
city by Rev. Joseph Knotts, and interment
was made in the A. F. & A. M.-I.
O. O. F. cemetery.

Nicy Jane Veatch was born in White
county, Illinois, December 6, 1832. She
removed with her parents to Iowa at
the age of 13, remaining there until her
marriage to L. B. Whorton October 17,
1851, when they went to Missouri.

Mr. and Mrs. Whorton, in company
with Mrs. Whorton's brothers, La-
fayette and Robert Veatch, and the fami-
lies of her two sisters, the late Mrs.
Ann Wallace and Mrs. Harriette Wal-
lace, of this city, left Missouri in April,
1864, crossed the plains by team, and ar-
rived in October of that year at the
homes of their brothers, Clayburne and
Sylvester. They remained at Cottage
Grove until 1886, when they moved to
Lakeview, Ore., where they resided 28
years. Mr. Whorton passed away April
12, 1911, since when Mrs. Whorton had
made her home with her daughter.

Three children, Manley and George,
of Reno, Nev., and Mrs. Minnie Willets,
of Dorena; one sister, Mrs. Harriette
Wallace, and one brother, Clayburne
Veatch, both of this city, survive her.
Mrs. Whorton had been a member of
the Presbyterian church for more than
70 years.
