 The subject for the Sunday morning service at the Methodist church will be "The Stewardship Challenge." The evening subject will be "Making Democracy Safe for the World."

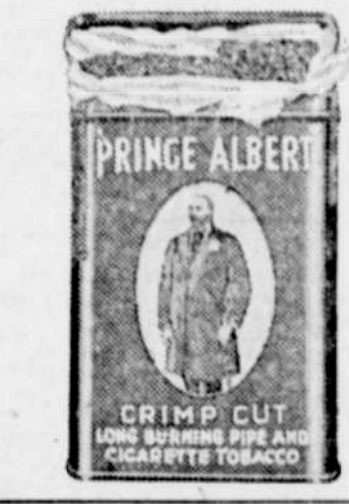
