WILL OPEN AUTO SERVICE STATION AND VULCANIZING PLANT HERE

Earl Harkelroad, of Eugene, has leased the building at 902 Main avenue, next door to the Woodson Brothers garage, and will establish a battery service station and tire and tube vulcanizing plant there in the near future. Equipment and stock are expected to arrive about the first of March.

SHERIFF AND REVENUE OFFICERS RAID MOONSHINE STILL AT COBURG

Sheriff Fred G. Stickle, assisted by internal revenue officers, seized an illicit still in the Coburg hills about 10 miles northeast of Eugene Wednesday of last week and arrested H. W. Buckingham and Virgil Clover, the alleged operators. The men, according to the officers, had a large quantity of material from which whisky is manufactured, but none of the distilled product was discovered. The officers said the two men were in the act of destroying their vats when

the arrests were made. The still was found to be the largest ever found in the Willamette valley. The raid was the result of a report, by an intoxicated man, who said his liquor came from moonshiners. As the man arrested claim they had sold none of their product, it is possible that there may be a second still in that vicinity.

derstood to have threatened that if the house did not pass this bill the said august senate would proceed to hold up the entire road program until said S. B. 67 did become a law. It is believed that the action today was merely for the purpose of throwing the senate's deft back in its teeth.

The Lane county members are taking a deep interest in road matters, and L. E. Bean, recognized as the most sane and constructive legislator of the session, expects to introduce a bill to be referred to the people which will provide a one mill tax to be used on market roads only. The provisions of the proposed legislation are such that no county of the state can draw more than 5 or 10 per cent of the money thus raised, which means that Multnomah county will put up 40 per cent of the fund, but can not get for its own use more than a small proportion of the amount raised. To secure any of this money, the county or road district must deposit with the highway commission an amount equal to that it asks from the fund and the money will be spent through the highway commission on roads approved by the highway engineer and under his supervision. The service of the highway engineer will be free to the counties. None of the money thus raised can be spent on other than what are commonly called market roads. The proposed tax would have to be referred to the people and would mean an expenditure of two million dollars a year upon market roads.
