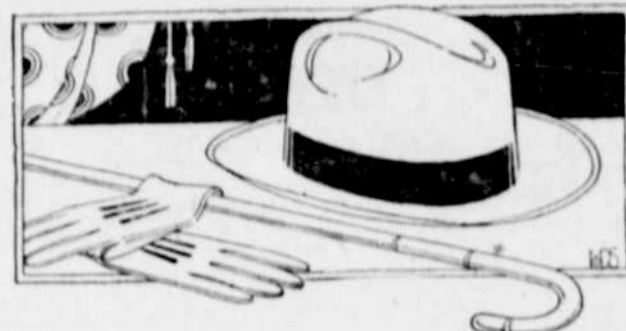

SOLDIERS MAY YET GET CHANCE FOR MILITARY SERVICE OVERSEAS

A dispatch from Washington says the new army bill, which will give Oregon soldiers, and others who failed to get across, a chance to enlist for one year and join the army of occupation, will be reported in a few days. This, the committee feels, will prove very popular with a lot of soldiers who yearned for overseas duty and were disappointed, and will release many men who have been on the other side for more than a

year and want to come home. It is understood that Senator Chamberlain favors the plan, and that the bill, so far as the senate is concerned, will be speedily passed.
