First of a Series of Local Meetings to

in Lane County.

The first of a series of local institutes to be held at various points in the county within the next few weeks will be conducted at Cottage Grove Saturday, March 8. These are designed to take the place of the annual institute, which, owing to the influenza epidemic, was not held this year.
