HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

To remove grass stains from white goods use kerosene, soap and warm water.

If you should upset the lamp in the house and the oil should get afire, do not try to put it out with water. Use salt, meal, ashes or sand.

A very simple and effective hand lotion is made of glycerine and lemon. Vinegar is also good to use on the hands after doing a washing.

Colored calicoes should be washed in lukewarm water, rubbed with good white soap and then rinsed in salt water. This sets the color and keeps it.

Salt and lemon juice will remove ink stains and iron rust. Milk will remove fresh fruit stains, while hot water will take out coffee or tea stains.

Vinegar will restore sun-faded lilac and lavender. Soak other shades of blue several hours in a solution of sugar of lead, one ounce to a gallon of water.

To keep the stove oven from rusting out from imprisoned steam, have the oven door ajar slightly when the oven is not to be used, and always open the door for awhile when the fire is dying out.

An easy way to put the required hole in the machine strap is to heat a long pin (a hat pin will answer the purpose nicely) until it is red hot. You will then have no difficulty in piercing the strap.

When making cookies, try forming the dough into a long roll about one inch in diameter and cutting into one-inch slices with a sharp knife. Flatten each slice slightly with the hand as you put them in the pan to bake.

TESTED RECIPES.

Poor Man's Delight—This is a dish much like French toast. It makes an attractive course for lunch or for the Sunday night supper. Take slices of stale bread fully an inch thick and soak them in milk in which two or three eggs have been well beaten. When the bread is well soaked and swelled through and through, fry it in butter. The butter should be quite deep in the pan and the bread nicely browned on both sides, and to secure the beautiful golden tone the butter should not be allowed to become too hot. When it is done, place on a plate and sprinkle with granulated sugar and cinnamon. Serve hot. This toast is a great favorite with

Buttermilk Pudding—A buttermilk pudding may be something of a novelty, and it is well worth making. It is very refreshing and is a nice hot weather dish. It is better if made the day before it is to be used. Serve either plain or with biscuits and cream. Use one and a half cupsful of fresh buttermilk, three lemons, three-fourths of a pound white sugar, ten sheets gelatine, seven white and three red, to make the pudding a pink color. Dissolve the sugar in the juice of the lemons, stir into the cold buttermilk and finally add the gelatine dissolved in some hot water. Pour into well-rinsed stone mold and stir now and then until the pudding begins to thicken. When quite set, turn out.
