SKULL AND CROSSED BONES FOR CARELESS DRIVERS OF AUTOS

St. Louis Demonstrates That All Accidents Are Result of Failure to Take Precautions.

With the approach of the summer season, with its tremendous increase in tourist traffic, the railroad administration is making a supreme effort to bring home to users of the roads the extreme hazards that exist at railroad crossings and to enlist the aid of the general public in avoiding accidents.

On the Southern Pacific lines north of Ashland there were during the five months' period, from October 1 to February 28, 73 collisions between vehicles and trains, nearly all the vehicles being automobiles. Three deaths and 35 injuries resulted.

A letter issued by the coroner of St. Louis, Mo., shows that through the efforts put forth during Safety First Campaign Week the accidents were greatly decreased. The deaths for the week were one, as compared with 10 the week before and 24 for the same week of the year before. The plain inference is that the exercise of caution will reduce accidents to a negligible quantity.

The railroad administration seems to have adopted the Safety First bulletin formerly issued by the Southern Pacific and the March issue contains a comprehensive article upon the little attention paid to the railroad crossing sign. A picture at the head of the story shows the well known crossed arms changed to the crossed bones and skull for the driver who ignores the sign put there for his safety. The inference is plain and significant.
