Many Animals Killed in 1918.
Indicative of the number of wild animals of destructive nature in Lane county is the set of figures, recently compiled by R. S. Bryson, county clerk, on bounties paid out during the year 1918. Following is the list: Wildcats, 179; seals, 71; Coyotes, 16; wolves, 12; cougars, 5. A total of \$721.50 was paid out in bounty money. The state adds \$15 for each cougar killed and \$20 for each wolf.
