

SENTINEL EDITORIAL GETS ATTENTION OF PASTOR OF M. E. CHURCH

Divine Appeals to Congregation and All Good Citizens to Stand Behind Newspaper.

The editorial in the most recent issue of The Sentinel upon the subject of dancing was unexpectedly referred to by Rev. Joseph Knotts, of the Methodist church, in his sermon Sunday forenoon. By a coincidence his subject was "Investment of Youth." The congregation was visibly stirred by the divergence from his prepared sermon.

Commenting upon the editorial he asked the congregation if they had read it and urged them to do so. He said in part: "While Editor Bede and I do not in all points look upon dancing in the same light, yet here we have a situation that demands our attention. While I hold that we should not have dancing because of its tendency to evil, he holds that dancing is all right. But when conditions are such that a man who believes in dancing protests against the condition of the dance as they exist in our community, it is high time that the people of the community sit up and take notice.

BLACK CLUB WHEAT

Black club wheat is something of a curiosity in this country of which Hiram Yancy is exhibiting fine samples.

The kernels are plump and there are 60 to 65 of them on some of the heads. Mr. Yancy says that the quality which particularly recommends this wheat is that regardless of how heavy

the heads may grow the stalks never fall. He thinks his yield will be at the rate of 25 bushels to the acre, although he says this variety of wheat has produced 40 bushels.

A guaranteed price of \$22.25 a hundred pounds for hogs is offered in the Portland stock yards, according to word received by W. A. Ayres, mana-
