Let me tell you that the American Legion disregards all rank and is strictly a civilian organization. So, gentlemen, think this over and think of its enormous possibilities, whether business problems or social activities are involved. And while you are thinking, remember that there are not any deeks to swab down or K. P. duty to stand in the American Legion.

And, lastly, when W. B. Pollett, who is a member of the national executive committee, and at present state organizer, arrives in Cottage Grove tonight, let us show him by our attendance at Moose hall that the men of Cottage Grove are ready to further a movement that will enable Uncle Sam, in these and future troublesome times, in casting up his accounts, to put down as the chief item under cash-in-hand The American Legion.

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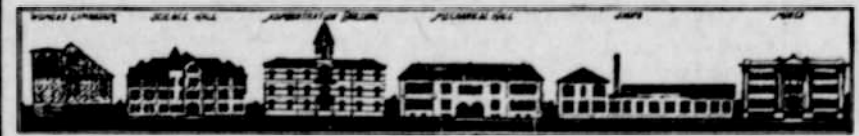
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
