

SCHOOLS WILL OPEN NEXT MONDAY MORNING

Pupils Are Asked to Be on Hand as Promptly the First Day as the Remainder of Year.

Everything is in readiness for the opening of the Cottage Grove school next Monday.

The grade teachers in the east side school are as follows: First, Miss Birdie Easley; second, Miss Hilda Harden; third, Miss Lillian Leonard; fourth, Miss Marjorie Shay; fifth, Miss Frances Cox.

Mrs. Irma Beager is principal of the west side school. Mrs. Beager, Miss Adelle White and Miss Mariette Hamant will teach the sixth, seventh and eighth grades under a departmental system which was used last year. All pupils of these grades will report to the west school. The other grade teachers in that school are Miss Eva Hopper, first and second; Miss Nora Queen, third and fourth, and Mrs. Woodruff.

All pupils of the fifth grade who live west of the river will report at the west school. It is likely that some from the east side of the river will later have to be transferred to Mrs. Woodruff's room since indications are that the fifth in the east school will be overcrowded.

Superintendent Beattie says parents should see that their children register the first day and that attendance is regular if the pupils are to make steady progress.

The teaching force of the high school now consists of Mrs. Beatrice Beebe, Mrs. Orpah Benson, Miss Lula Currin, Miss Elizabeth Devaney, J. F. Godard and Miss Margaret McDonald. Miss Currin has been named as principal of the high school. Mr. Beattie will have charge of the teachers' training class in addition to his duties as superintendent. The board has under advisement

the election of another teacher in order to broaden the work offered by the high school. Indications are that there will be a large enrollment.

The superintendent has called a general teachers' meeting to be held in room 13 at the high school building Friday afternoon at three o'clock. All teachers are expected to be present at this meeting.
