DOUGLAS FIR MILL MARKET

Douglas fir lumber is being shipped in heavy quantities from the Pacific Northwest into the southern states. The Douglas fir mills of the northwest for big ship timbers.

But in the last few months the southern retail yards have begun to stock up with Douglas fir—a movement that is destined to grow in that part of the country.

The people of Knoxville, Tenn., for instance, joined in a civic demonstration a short time ago to celebrate the receipt by a retail yard there of the first carload of Douglas fir timbers. The shipment was sent by one of the Grays Harbor mills. Upon arrival two pieces, 24x24 inches, 36 feet long, were loaded onto a motor truck and paraded through the principal streets. The spectacle attracted much attention as the natives were not accustomed to seeing timbers of such size.

An official of the company receiving the shipment advised that the fir was ordered for stock requirements rather than as an experiment. "Our experience with this shipment has been very satisfactory and encouraging," he says, "and we intend in the near future to put in a complete stock of these timbers for remanufacture into smaller sizes."

Douglas fir manufacturers in Oregon and Washington look for a steady increase in yard orders from the south. A heavy movement of oil derrick timbers to the oil fields of Oklahoma and other southern states has been under way for a long time, shipments approximating 100 carloads a month. As the trade in that part of the country becomes acquainted with Douglas fir for one purpose it is easier to sell it for other purposes, the mill men declare.
