What is the object of the American Legion?

For God and Country we associate ourselves together for the following purposes:

To uphold and defend the constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the great war; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness.

The foregoing paragraph is the preamble of the American Legion, and will serve as an ample explanation of the opening question.

Can earthly beings vision any more exalted ideals? Is it not fitting and proper that we should seek to maintain and cultivate the greatest comradeship that ever sprang up among mankind?

At the present time there are more than 700,000 service men in the ranks of the American Legion. Our post, Calvin T. Funk No. 32, at Cottage Grove, now boasts of over 65 members. When all have returned we expect to have a membership of over 300, which number, taking into consideration the total population of the community, should be a source of pride to all.
