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TESTED RECIPES.

Economical Dressing—I had a few
teaspoonfuls of mayonnaise left in a
pint jar the other day, also an egg
yolk left from fluffing up a sherbet,
so I put the egg on top of the other
dressing in the jar with one-half tea-
spoon mustard, same of salt and a lit-
tle white pepper. On top of that I
poured two tablespoonfuls of lemon
juice, screwed on the top and shook
well. Then I poured in one-half cupful
of salad oil and some more juice and
shook again until thick, and added
more oil and lemon juice until the jar
was too full to shake, and it was the
best I ever made; no dishes to wash
except a spoon and cup, and my hands,
which were rather oily.

Frozen Cucumber Salad—Take six
large green cucumbers, cut a slice
lengthwise from each one and with a
silver teaspoon remove the seeds and
pulp and throw the hulls in cold water
until ready to use. Peel and chop
coarsely two whole cucumbers, add to
them the seeds and pulp of the other
six, and let stand in salted ice water
one hour. Cucumbers should have a
thick peeling taken off of them as
they are bitter near the skin. Now

drain the water from them, add two
tablespoonfuls of chopped chives, one
teaspoonful of grated onion, two table-
spoonfuls of chopped celery, one cupful
of mayonnaise, salt and tobacco sauce
to taste. Color with spinach green and
freeze. When frozen stiff fill the cu-
cumber hulls with it, place them on
fresh crisp lettuce leaves and serve at
once.

Baked Oatmeal and Nuts—Two cup-
fuls of cooked oatmeal, one cupful of
crushed peanuts, half a cupful of milk,
one teaspoonful of vinegar, ¼ tea-
spoonful of pepper and 2½ teaspoon-
fuls of salt. Mix together and bake in
a greased pan 15 minutes. This is suf-
ficient to serve five people.

Try dipping liver in milk before fry-
ing it. It will fry a nice brown and
will not be hard.

To be sure of unadulterated pepper,
one may purchase a small grinder and
make it.

Tin marshmallow boxes can be cov-
ered with chintz and made into deli-
cious candy boxes.

Cold tea used on varnished floors or
woodwork of any kind will give it a
beautiful luster.
