Lane county is one of the few counties where the work is being handled entirely by women.

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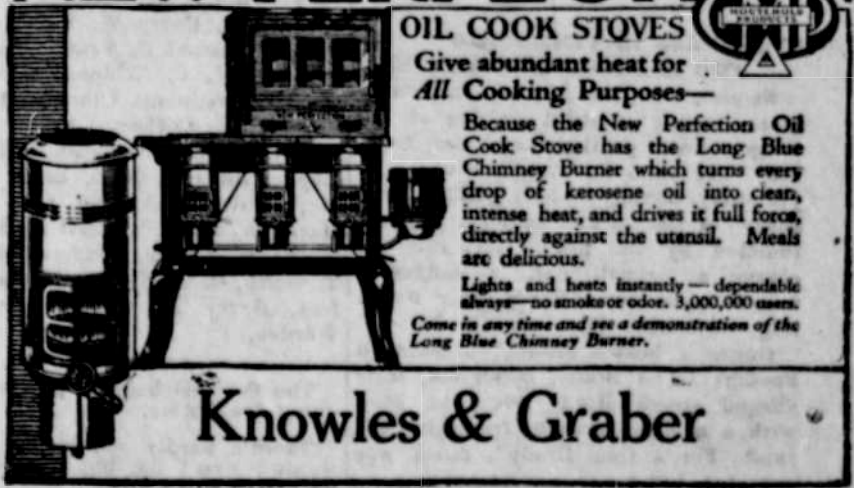
