A hot iron covered with a wet cloth and applied to velvet while damp will raise the nap.

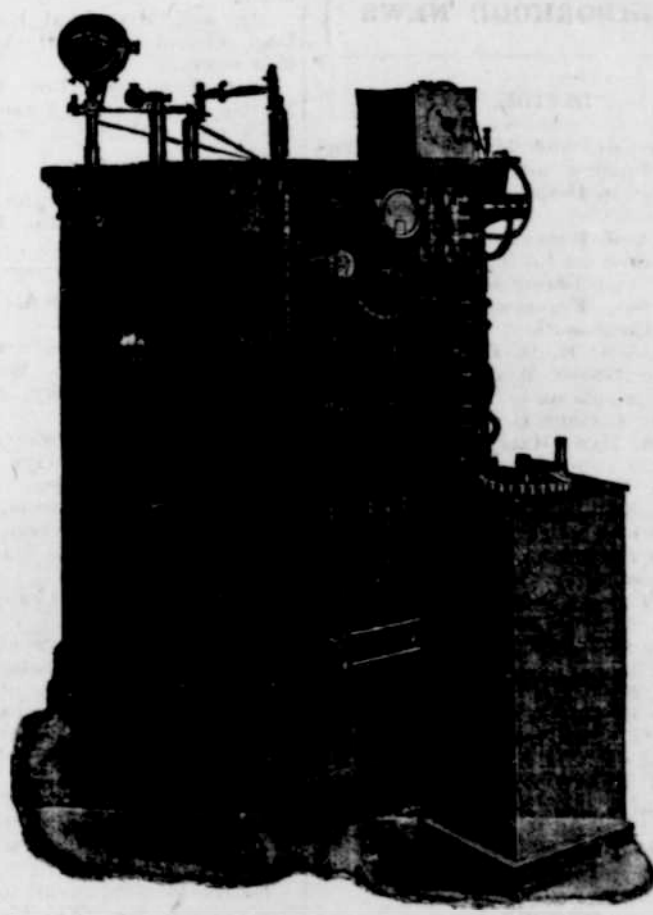
Blankets should always be pulled well down at the foot of the bed and tucked under the mattress.
