Bledsoe Is Freed.

After having been in the county jail since September 11, on a statutory charge, J. D. Bledsoe, of Yakima, Wash., has been discharged from custody, the case against him having been dismissed after a jury had been secured in the circuit court to try him. Bledsoe's attorney, Howard M. Brown, after the jury was secured, brought up the point that in a case of this kind only the wife of the accused can prosecute, and as Bledsoe's wife refused to appear against her husband, he asked that the case be dismissed.

This fact, together with the fact that A. N. Carney, husband of the woman connected with the case, also failed to appear, caused a dismissal of the charge. Mrs. Bledsoe, who had been sent for to appear as a witness for her husband, arrived from Yakima a few hours after he had left for home. Bledsoe was arrested at the Rajada logging camp by Deputy Sheriff Pitcher, and the woman in the case disappeared immediately afterward.
