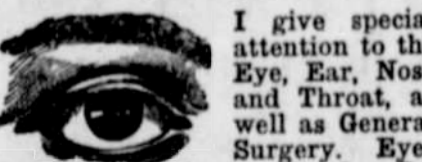

**AD. SELLS THOUSANDS OF BABY CHICKS FOR DAN WALTON**
