Cottage Grove, Ore., Dec. 18, 1919.—We, the undersigned physicians of Cottage Grove, Oregon, on account of the constant increase in the cost of living and the increased cost of medical and surgical supplies have found it necessary in order to be able to meet our own obligations to raise the existing fees to the following:

Day visits in the city, \$2.50.  
Night visits in the city, \$3.50.  
Office visits, ordinary, \$1.50.  
Telephone advice or prescription, \$1.50.

Each additional number in family, \$1.00.

Unusual detention on a case, per hour, \$2.00.

Visits to contagious cases, a visit, \$3.00.

Visits in country outside of city limits, same as town visits plus mileage of \$1.00 per mile.

Ordinary confinement cases in city, \$35.00; in country \$1.00 per mile extra.

All other charges shall be governed by the fee bill of the State Industrial Accident Commission of Oregon.
