## Notice to Light and Power Users

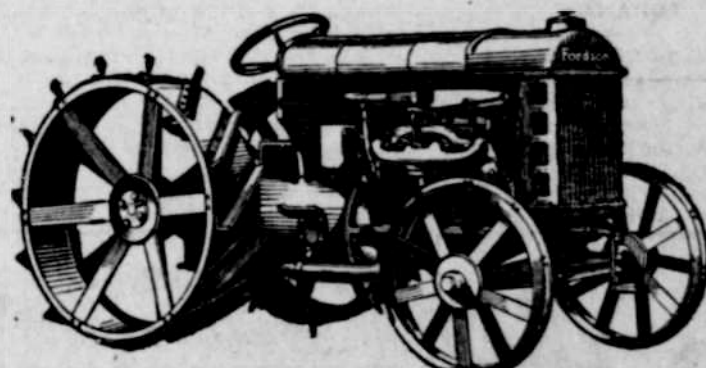
The power plant will be shut down at midnight Saturday and remain down until lights are needed Sunday afternoon. This is done in order to make necessary repairs to the boiler.
