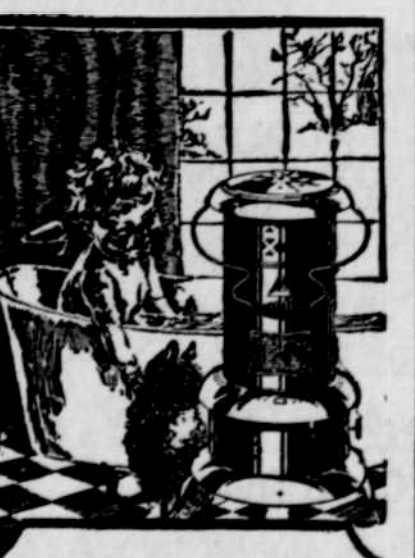

Household Hints

To boil eggs that are cracked, wrap in a piece of white muslin and there will be no danger of cooking out into the water.

Use a gravy boat to fill jars with preserves. It is easily dipped into the hot kettle of fruit by means of the handle, and the long mouth fits into jars of any size and thus prevents spilling.

The common nut cracker makes a splendid little household wrench for cans and bottles with screw tops. Even the stubborn glass stopper will yield to the gentle pressure of this convenient little article.

If a piece of lemon is added to a pan of cold water and wilted vegetables allowed to stand in the water an hour or so they will be as fresh as when gathered. Especially good for lettuce, celery, spinach and parsley.

SECOND OVERHEAD CROSSING MAY BE ORDERED TO NORTH

The construction of an overhead crossing on Pacific highway at McVeigh's Point, four miles south of Eugene, where the Southern Pacific track intersects the highway, and where there is a bad turn in the track near by, making the crossing extremely dangerous, will probably be ordered by the state public service commission in the near future.

A hearing on the project was held at the court house in Eugene a few days ago, the public service commission taking evidence as to the advisability of the overhead structure and as to the danger to traffic at that point.

According to plans submitted at the hearing by engineers, the structure will be 722 feet long. Six hundred feet will be of wooden construction with piling foundation, and 122 feet of reinforced concrete construction. It is estimated that the cost will be in the neighborhood of \$60,000.

In paving the highway between Eugene and Goshen last fall the contract called for the omission of a stretch on both sides of this crossing with the idea in view of building this overhead structure.

Besides Chairman Williams, of the state public service commission, there were present at the hearing engineers and attorneys for both the railway company and the state highway commission.

County Judge H. L. Bown, after the hearing, stated that he objects to the erection of the overhead structure, as he did the one at Divide, deeming it an unnecessary expense. He declared that the money could be spent to a better advantage in building roads.

In order to encourage contractors to store materials for state work during the year 1920 and thereby guard against delays of operation due to the car shortage, the highway commission at its last meeting authorized the state engineer to estimate material up to 75 per cent of its actual cost and include the same in the contractor's monthly estimate.

Proscriptions for violating the livestock quarantine regulations are forecast by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, in case reports received at his office from Klamath county are found to be true. It is reported, according to Dr. Lytle, that a number of stockmen have imported sheep into Oregon from California without first complying with the federal quarantine regulations.

Action will be brought at once by some of the settlers on the Central Oregon irrigation project to oust the project, according to H. H. DeArmond, a Bend attorney representing the dissatisfied portion of the settlers. The settlers will attempt, through legal procedure, to cut off the company's revenues from the sale of water to the settlers and to determine whether the settlers own the water rights they hold under contracts.

Snow reserves in the watersheds of the Deschutes and other central Oregon streams are lower than at any time in the memory of the oldest settlers and unless heavy precipitation comes by early spring, ranchers are threatened with an insufficient supply of water for irrigation. Men returning from trips into the mountains report that in places in the Cascades where snow is ordinarily 12 feet deep or better, there is now none at all, and in other spots where a still greater amount is regarded as usual, there is now only a moderate blanket.

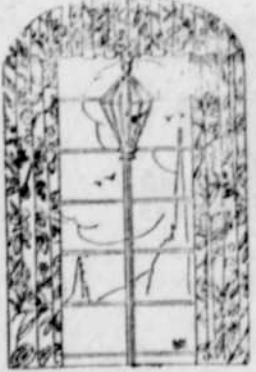
