

WELSH GLEE QUARTET, LAST LYCEUM NUMBER, AT HIGH SCHOOL TONIGHT



With one exception the members of the Welsh Glee Quartet began their respective careers as choir boys. Singing has been their profession ever since. As soloists they have successfully appeared both here and abroad. As a quartet their ensemble work is notable for robust volume, almost perfect blending of voices and varied re-

sources of interpretation. They sing with the zestful ease of men to whom singing is second nature and entertainment first thought.

Mr. George S. Thomas, lyric tenor, made his first appearance in the United States as a soloist with the Rhonda Male Voice Choir of Wales, which distinguished itself by taking first honors at the international Eisteddfod held in Pittsburgh some several years ago. He remained in this country to continue his success as a church and concert artist and has achieved special popularity as a singer of ballads. As an added diversion he introduces, in costume, songs typical of the London costermonger, having studied that interesting individual at first hand.

Mr. G. Edgar Thomas, tenor robust, the one time favored pupil of John Waltyrs, of London, England, has fully vindicated that great teacher's estimates of his possibilities as a dramatic tenor. In competition in England and France he has won eleven out of a possible twelve gold medals. In Wales he has been declared "out of competition" by reason of winning during the course of a recent national Eisteddfod, the first prize and gold medal against a field of forty-two entrants gathered from all parts of the world. He has appeared on tour with the world famous English singer, Barry Lindon, and has sung before ex-President Poincaré of France and King George V of England. Since his return to the United States he has frequently been heard as soloist with a number of the most important choral societies in the east.

Mr. Samuel Jones, baritone, is another gold medalist, having been

awarded the first prize on two occasions in open championship competitions in Wales. Acting on the advice of one of the greatest of Welsh baritone, George T. Llewellyn, who was also his teacher, Mr. Jones devoted himself chiefly to oratorio, a field of music in which he has experienced flattering success. In a lighter vein he is heard to best advantage in story-ballads of romance and adventure, particularly those with a medieval flavor.

Mr. Joseph E. Batchelor, basso and monologist, began his musical career as a boy-soprano soloist with the famous boy choir of St. Clement's church, London, England. Under leading teachers of Europe and America he developed into a basso of fine range and expressiveness. During the past ten years he has been successfully engaged in oratorio, concert and opera in England, Canada and the United States. In addition to being an adept in the interpretation of songs that require more than ordinary characterization or a touch of the grotesque or humorous, Mr. Batchelor is a monologist of professional caliber and a most acceptable accompanist.

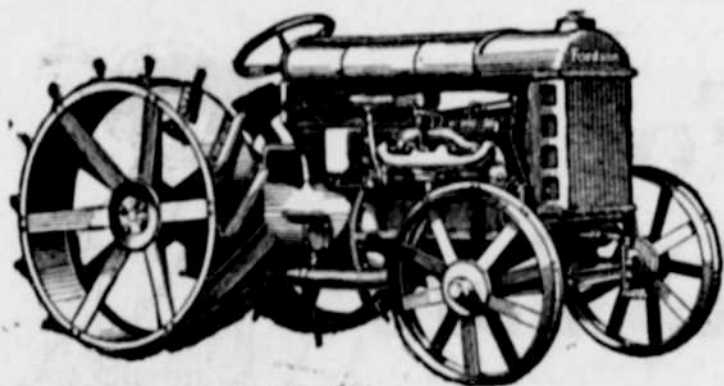
