### LOCAL HEALTH ASSOCIATION COMMITTEE HOLDS MEETING

The Cottage Grove committee of the Lane County Health association met at the high school Monday afternoon and reviewed the work of the past two months, no regular meeting having been held in February on account of the influenza. The supply committee reported that one needy family had been supplied with gowns upon the request of the attending physician. The nurses' committee reported that a number of cases had been under supervision, and a new list was ready for the use of the county nurse.

Miss Brownell, who has been exceedingly busy during the recent epidemic, is now returning to her regular schedule of visiting the schools of the county, and any homes where there

may be need of advice or assistance. The schools at Dorena, Star and Wildwood were inspected during the past week.

Anyone in the community who would like a nurse's advice on bedside nursing, care of invalids in the home, or of infants, should communicate with Mrs. C. M. Shinn, chairman of the nurses' committee, and Miss Brownell will gladly call at their home upon her next visit to Cottage Grove.
