Miss Donna Bartell is attending the rose festival in Portland this week in

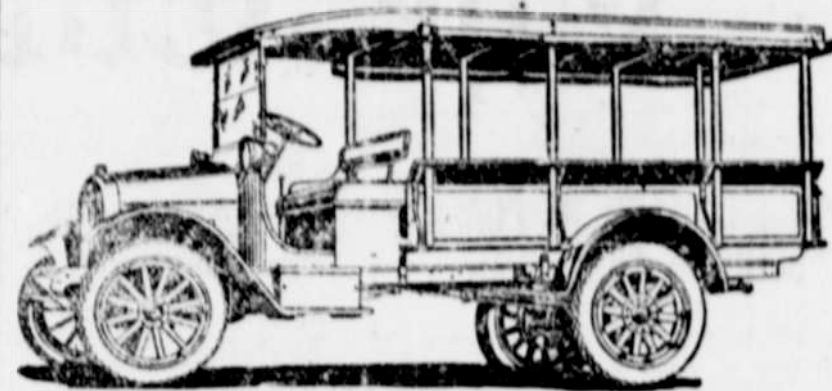
company with Dr. and Mrs. T. W. Harris, of Eugene.

**ENGINE:**  
The Chevrolet one ton truck engine is of the valve-in-the-head, and detachable head type, with aluminum pistons, water pump circulation, two unit starting and lighting system, and with a unit power plant—clutch and all parts totally enclosed. This engine has recently been adopted for use on two other trucks, a tractor and two passenger cars.

**REAR AXLE:**  
The rear axle is of malleable iron well ribbed to give great strength with minimum weight. The 2 inch shafts of Chrome-Vanadium heat treated steel, run at the outer ends in a double row of New Departure Ball Bearings.

The final drive is of the worm type, with hardened steel worm and extra large bronze worm gear. All radial and thrust loads are taken by New Departure Ball Bearings and no thrust adjustment is ever required.
