GOOD THINGS FOR SUMMER LUNCHEONS.

With berries becoming plentiful and many regions where wild berries are to be had, there are many delicious dishes to be made from them, both now and canned for future use, when the season is over.



Fruit Mush.—Pick over and wash any fruit in season; add one-half its bulk of boiling water and cook slowly until tender enough to be put through a sieve fine enough to retain the seeds when such fruits as blackberries are used. Use this fruit pulp instead of water in cooking any breakfast foods. Stir in a little sugar and mold in cups. Serve cold with cream for breakfast, or for dessert.

Fruit Tapioca.—Cook together equal measures of fruit and water until soft enough to put through a sieve. Measure, return to the fire and for each cupful add a scant tablespoonful of tapioca. Stir frequently until it swells, then cover and cook until transparent. Add sufficient sugar to sweeten; pour into a serving dish and set aside. Serve with ice-cold cream.

Strawberry Pudding.—Butter thin slices of moist bread and arrange a layer in a baking dish. Crush a pint of strawberries, adding a little water to make more juice and sufficient sugar to sweeten. Pour the fruit over the bread, arrange another layer and let stand covered in a cold place. Serve with cream and sugar. This is a dessert you need not fear to give the children.

Cherry Pudding.—Take one cupful of flour, one teaspoonful of baking powder, one-quarter of a teaspoonful of salt; sift and mix well and add one-half cupful of milk to make a drop batter. Butter small custard cups or molds and drop in a spoonful of the latter; add a tablespoonful or two of pitted cherries, juice and all; sweeten to taste. Set the cups into a shallow pan, pour around them boiling water to half fill the pan, and cover closely, cooking fifteen minutes. Unmold and serve with a cherry sauce or cream and sugar, or sweetened whipped cream.

GOOD CAKES.

The days when a pound or even a cupful of butter was used in making cakes are now almost forgotten and with sugar scarce and high, cakes except of the simplest kinds are a luxury.



Golden Orange Cake.—Take one-half cupful of clarified drippings, one cupful of New Orleans molasses, one egg, one tablespoonful of sugar, the juice and rind of a small orange, one teaspoonful of soda dissolved in one-half cupful of cold water, two cupfuls of pastry flour, a pinch of salt. Mix as usual; bake in a shallow pan. Butter while hot and cover with powdered sugar.

Cream Loaf.—Cream one-half cupful of shortening, add one cupful of sugar and the well-beaten yolks of two eggs. Add one-half cupful of milk or thin cream, one cupful of flour and one-half cupful of cornstarch sifted with three teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Mix and beat well; then fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Bake in a well greased loaf pan about forty-five minutes.

Club Cake.—Take one cupful of brown sugar, one-half cupful of shortening, one cupful of buttermilk, one teaspoonful of soda, allspice, cloves to taste, one cupful of raisins (nuts and citron may be added if liked) two cupfuls of flour and vanilla to flavor. Bake in layers and put together with chocolate filling.

Angel Food.—Take one cupful of egg whites, one cupful of sugar, one cupful of sifted flour, one teaspoonful of phosphate baking powder. Put half the baking powder into the egg white and half into the sifted flour. Bake 50 to 60 minutes in a slow oven.

Rolls Jelly Cake.—Take three eggs, one cupful of sugar, one cupful of flour, two tablespoonfuls of baking powder. Beat the eggs until light, add sugar, two tablespoonfuls of cold water, pinch of salt. Stir in the flour sifted with the baking powder, adding flour gradually. Bake in a dripping pan well greased. Turn out on a towel wrung out of cold water. Spread with jelly; roll up while warm.

WATERPOWER BILL SIGNED BY WILSON

Washington.—The waterpower bill passed by congress just before adjournment has been signed by President Wilson.

Accompanying the announcement was a statement that the president had acted after being advised by the attorney general that adjournment of congress had not deprived him of the 10 days allowed by the constitution for the consideration of a measure.

The new law releases power for almost unlimited industrial development in this country and is considered one of the most important laws enacted during the sixty-sixth session.

In addition to the waterpower bill the president signed several minor measures but not the resolution repealing wartime legislation and the Underwood bill creating a commission to take up the print paper and pulp wood question with Canada.

HOME ECONOMY IS URGED

More Labor-Saving Devices for Women Advocated.

Washington.—Modernization of farm homes and general usage of labor-saving devices as a means to prevent wastage of woman power are urged in a report made public by the department of agriculture, agents of which recently conducted a survey of farm homes.

A reasonable amount of planning and well-directed investment in modern farm home equipment, the report asserts, would prevent a large part of the present wastage of energy on the part of the nation's rural home makers.

Governor Olcott appointed John F. Stelwer, a prominent farmer of Jefferson, as a member of the group of five to represent the citizens of the state on the committee of 15 to investigate changes in the workmen's compensation law to be recommended to the next session of the state legislature. Mr. Stelwer succeeds C. L. Hawley of McCoy as a member of the committee.

Train Robber Shot When Leaving Car.

Sacramento, Cal.—A lone robber who boarded the second section of the Southern Pacific Atlantic express by climbing onto the rear of the observation car at Davis, near here, was shot and probably killed by Al Rodell, a passenger, of Cleveland, O., after the robber had shot twice at Conductor Muldowney of Oakland. The robber toppled from the forward platform of the observation car, where he had opened the door to jump off at a crossing.

Walla Walla Shows Decrease.

Washington.—The 1920 population of Walla Walla, Wash., is 15,502, according to the announcement of the census bureau. This is a decrease of 3861, or 19.9 per cent since 1910.

To co-operate in efforts to rid their community of Canadian thistle, farmers residing in the vicinity of Grand Prairie grange hall east of Albany have formed a Canadian Thistle club. Each member is pledged not only to rid his own land of thistles but to report any person he knows of who lets the thistles go to seed.

H. J. Sankey, representative of the British colonial office, is in Bend in the course of a three months' tour of the United States. He is visiting all centers of the lumber industry to gain a knowledge of American milling and logging methods in the hopes of applying some of them to mahogany exploitation in Africa.

Plenty of precipitation in the Oregon country has obviated the necessity for immediate operation of the forest patrol airplanes and it is probable that regular schedules will not be maintained before July 1, prior to which time installation of radio equipment on the planes which have arrived at Eugene will be completed.

Three of the 445 accidents in Oregon industries for the week ending June 24 were fatal, according to reports received by the state industrial accident commission. Workmen who lost their lives in industrial accidents during the week were: J. Kietly, laborer, Portland; J. W. Deal, laborer, North Portland; L. W. Green, auto mechanic, Portland.

At a cost of \$15,000 the Bend Water, Light & Power company has completed the construction of a reserve plant two miles up the Deschutes river. The reserve plant is capable of supplying the city of Bend with 1500 gallons of water a minute, double the amount consumed in the hottest weather.

Governor Olcott has received a letter from Herbert Slesholt of Allentown, Pa., urging the executive to use his influence in obtaining the enactment of legislation which will make it incumbent upon all citizens of the United States to wear red, white and blue ribbons on Armistice day, November 11.

The secretary of state Friday received two checks aggregating \$10,193.82, covering the sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon for the month of May by the Associated Oil company of California and the Shell Oil company of California.

The pure-bred sire campaign that has become nationwide will be fostered by the Lane County Pure-Bred Livestock association. The plan of this campaign is to encourage nothing but pure-bred sires among the herds of the farmers and stock raisers.

With only three votes cast against it, the proposition of bonding the Grants Pass irrigation district in the sum of \$400,000 was carried at the special election Saturday, the proceeds of the bond issue to be used in the construction of a gravity irrigation project.

A carload of 27 heavy draft horses was shipped out of Albany by express billed to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. The expressage amounted to almost \$500, but the shippers estimated that, considering the feed bill and time lost, it would cost almost as much to send the horses by freight.

More than 1000 people viewed the impressive ceremonies incident to the laying of the cornerstone of the Masonic and Eastern Star home near Forest Grove. Judge Earl C. Bronaugh, grand master, and Mrs. Alberta S. McMurphy, worthy grand matron, were in charge of the ceremonies.

Bids opened for furnishing supplies for the state institutions during the six months starting July 1 and ending December 31 indicate a substantial increase in prices when compared with the proposals received for similar supplies last December, according to R. B. Goodin, state purchasing agent.

Oregon, with purchases of war savings securities aggregating 8 cents per capita for the month of April and with a total of 51 cents per capita for the year up to May 1, ranks third among the states of the union, according to a report issued by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction.

The first wagon to cross the summit of the Cascade mountains by way of the McKenzie river highway left the Lost creek ranch above McKenzie bridge Sunday, June 12, and succeeded in making the trip without a great deal of difficulty, according to word from Sisters, on the other side of the mountains.

The copious showers that have visited Morrow county within the last ten days give promise of the heaviest crop of wheat that has been harvested since 1916, which was the banner crop in the history of the county. Within the period named more than an inch of moisture has fallen and the precipitation has been general.

Automobile tourists passing through Baker have made statements to the effect that at Salt Lake City thousands of travelers had been turned from the old Oregon trail because of erroneous reports that it was impossible to obtain gasoline in Oregon. In Idaho the tourists were told that gasoline in Oregon cost 55 cents a gallon.

Under the direction of a citizens' committee headed by Mayor Eastes, W. R. Speck, Standard Oil manager at Bend, suspended deliveries of gasoline to all garages and service stations. With only 3000 gallons of motor fuel on hand, and no shipments promised, sale of gasoline was confined to the pine milling companies, mail stages, physicians and proprietors of milk routes.

F. A. Elliott, state forester, has returned from Bend, where he obtained an emergency landing field to be used by aviators engaged in patrolling the forests of central Oregon during the approaching fire season. The field contains several hundred acres and is located near Crane prairie. Another emergency field will be located a short distance south of Mount Jefferson, according to Mr. Elliott.

Certificates of nomination affecting all successful candidates of the republican and democratic parties at the recent primary election were mailed Saturday by Sam Kozar, secretary of state. In case where a candidate of one party was defeated, but received the nomination of another party, he will not receive a certificate. Refusal by the secretary of state to issue these certificates is authorized under a law passed at the 1919 session of the legislature and which became effective for the first time at the recent primary contest.

The so-called compromise regarding the framing of the Roosevelt bird refuge measure, to be submitted to the voters of Oregon at the November election, is very unsatisfactory, according to Percy Copper, state engineer. The original bill he says, caused a storm of protest and a conference was called in Portland for the purpose of reaching some agreement among the persons interested in the bird refuge and the irrigationists adjacent to Malheur lake. Nothing was accomplished at this conference, according to Mr. Copper, and the measure as revamped is not satisfactory. Mr. Copper contends that Oregon owns too much land at the present time and that the establishment of more reserves will have a tendency to increase taxes without gaining for the taxpayers corresponding benefits.
