Household Hints

To take the bitter taste from tea after inadvertently boiling it, pour a small amount of cold water into it at once.

A cloth moistened with warm water and kerosene makes a stove look black when blacking is unnecessary.

When cutting fresh bread, heat the knife in hot water.

Small pieces of empor scattered in the cupboard keep mice away.

Put eggs to be stuffed in cold water as soon as they leave the stove.

Be sure that tea is dry before you make it into a beverage.

The objectionable smell of new paint can be removed from a room by standing a pail of water, to which some hay has been added, in the center of the room. Leave several hours and all odor will have disappeared.

Suet chopped fine and rendered in the oven makes excellent fat for frying.

To ship a large picture or mirror without breaking the glass, paste narrow strips of paper diagonally across the glass. This breaks the vibrations and prevents damage that often results.

Always keep a piece of finest sand paper in the kitchen. If the bread or cake should get browned a bit too much it can be rubbed off much more smoothly than if a grater is used.
