HARDING QUESTIONS COX

Republican Nominee Asks Opponent to Declare Foreign Policy.

Marion, O.—A bill of particulars detailing the foreign policy now proposed by the democratic party was called for by Warren G. Harding, republican nominee for president.

In a broadside of pointed interrogatories, the candidate challenged his democratic opponent, Governor Cox, to say categorically where he stood on Article 10, the Armenian mandate and the other problems wrapped up in American participation in the league of nations.

Senator Harding's statement was written while the Washington conference between President Wilson and Gov. Cox was in progress.

BOLSHEVIKI CLOSE TO POLISH CAPITAL

Captured Vessels Are Used By Poles in Blocking Advance on Warsaw.

London.—The Russians are pushing their fight for Warsaw within a dozen miles of the capital on the northeast, it is indicated from an official statement from Moscow.

They report the capture of Radzymin, in this sector, and the continuation of the battle along this front and also near Novo Georgievsk, to the northeast of Warsaw.

The capture of Soldau, twelve miles northeast of Mlawka, also is announced. A Polish statement conceded the capture of Radzymin, but added that the town was recaptured by the white Ruthenian division and that a desperate struggle was continuing.

Warsaw.—An armored flotilla is patrolling the Vistula river between Warsaw and Thorn to prevent the Bolsheviks from crossing to encircle this city. Many of these boats saw service along the Prepita and Dnieper rivers, some having been captured from the Bolsheviks.

Soviet cavalry is working westward and was reported at several points west of Warsaw.

ENGLAND WARNED ANTI-RED CHIEF

London.—Premier Lloyd George stated in the house of commons that the government had made it clear to General Baron Wrangel, anti-bolshevik leader in South Russia, that if he further attacked the soviet forces he must do so on his own responsibility. General Wrangel since then had opened further operations, the premier added and the responsibility, consequently, was his own.

Premier Lloyd George replied concerning labor's ultimatum against war on Russia, declared that any attempt to dictate the policy of the government or parliament by industrial action struck at the root of the democratic constitution of the country and would be resisted by all the forces at the government's disposal.

TROTZKY GOES TO FRONT

All Europe Will Be Bolshevik, Says War Minister.

Warsaw.—Leon Trotzky, Russian bolshevik minister of war, has arrived at Bialystok, just behind the soviet front, and has set up headquarters there. Speaking in Vilna, capital of Lithuania, recently, he announced that soviet Russia has been officially recognized by the western powers and that M. Krassin and M. Kameneff, heads of the bolshevik commercial mission to Great Britain, had been received at London with the ceremonials usually accorded foreign ambassadors. He asserted that bolshevism was more powerful than ever and would soon spread to other countries.

"In a year" he continued, "all Europe will be bolshevik."

McCall Named on Tariff Commission.

Washington.—President Wilson has induced former Governor Samuel W. McCall of Massachusetts to accept an appointment as a member of the United States tariff commission, it was announced at the White House. McCall was named as a recess appointee, but refused to take the post. At the instance of the president, he has reconsidered.

Government Expenditures Heavy.

Washington.—Government expenditures during September probably will jump nearly \$900,000,000, it was estimated by treasury officials. Nearly two thirds of this sum will represent payments to railroads.

Republicans Invaded by Radical Forces

Spokane, Wash.—The Non-partisan league, the Railwaymen's Welfare league, the committee of 48 and other radical organizations invaded the Republican party here, when they filed a complete state, senatorial, legislative and county ticket.

Premier of Greece Shot in France.

Paris.—Prime Minister Elphtherios Constantine Venizelos of Greece, narrowly escaped assassination at the hands of fellow-countrymen as he was entering the Lyons railway station. He was shot in the left shoulder and the right thigh.

U. S. Cruiser Ordered to Baltic Sea.

Washington.—Rear Admiral Huse commanding the United States cruiser Pittsburg, has been ordered to the Baltic sea to protect American citizens in that district.

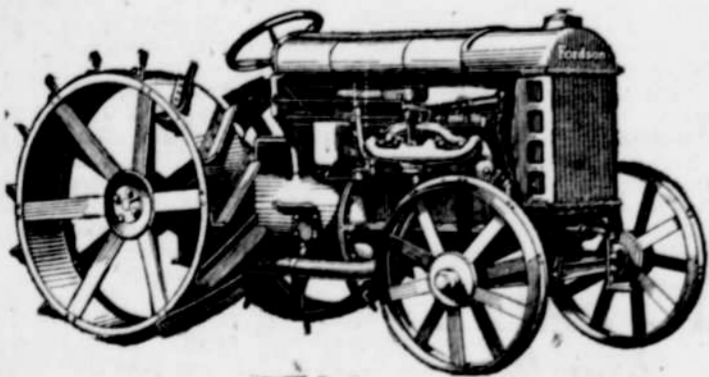
