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DETECTIVES HUNT FOR BOMB SUSPECTS

Architects Held to Blame for
Destructive Wall Street
Explosion.

New York.—The investigation of the explosion in Wall street, which cost 35 lives and did property damage exceeding \$1,000,000, broadly divided itself into two separate channels.

Firm in their belief that the disaster was caused by a time bomb planted by a band of anarchists, who were also implicated in the mail bomb plots in June, 1919, department of Justice investigators, headed by William J. Flynn, chief of the department's bureau of investigation, have concentrated their efforts in seeking the identity of the person or persons who deposited five radical circulars in a mail box near the scene just a few minutes before the explosion.

Statements by two men, one of whom claims to have seen the "death wagon" which carried the explosive standing near the assay office at 10:30 A. M., one and one-half hours before the explosion in Wall street occurred, and the other, who claims to have seen three men running away from the scene just before the blast, furnished the most important developments in the investigations of the disaster.

Experts in the police bomb squad who have examined and placed together metal fragments believed to have been part of the bomb declared the deadly missile apparently weighed about 500 pounds, 200 of which were the explosive itself.

The most tangible clue discovered is the steel shoes from the hind hoofs of the horse which hauled the "bomb wagon" to the corner of Broad and Wall streets. The police were reported to have found the blacksmith who shod the horse.

SEATTLE REDS BEING WATCHED

Seattle, Wash.—Surveillance over Seattle "red" suspects, as a result of the Wall Street bomb explosion last week, was tightened by the department of justice bureau of investigation here while the United States secret service is continuing the guard placed on the United States assay office and the Seattle Branch Federal Reserve bank.

Increased activity of the bureau of investigation was caused by receipt of a copy of an anonymous letter written in Milwaukee, threatening assassination of persons prominent in prosecution of those responsible for the Armistice day murders in Centralia. An invasion of Centralia by 24 armed radicals about October 15 is threatened in the letter, apparently written by a woman, according to J. F. McAuley, head of the northwest bureau of investigation.

BOYS OF '61 MEET AGAIN

Dwindling Ranks Forces Request for Increase in Dues.

Indianapolis, Ind.—The boys who in '61 answered the call of "Father Abraham" own Indianapolis. The city and state were formally turned over to them by Mayor Charles W. Jewett and Governor James P. Goodrich at a semi-official meeting and reception marking the formal opening of the 1920 reunion of the G. A. R. here Monday.

The executive committee voted to ask the delegates to increase the per capita tax to 10 cents per month. The tax is 3½ cents, not having been changed since 1890, when the membership was 394,000. The membership at present is 103,200 and it will be necessary to take money from the permanent fund to pay expenses of the encampment.

Will Not Rescind Ratification.

Washington.—Secretary Colby has refused to grant the request of anti-suffragists from Tennessee that he rescind his action in proclaiming ratification of the federal suffrage amendment on the basis of favorable action on the amendment by the Tennessee legislature.

Investigate Iowa Rail Board Order.

Washington.—An investigation of the action of the Iowa state board of railroad commissioners in dismissing the railroads' intrastate petition was ordered by the interstate commerce commission. Hearings will begin October 8 at Des Moines.

Poland and Lithuania Agree.

Paris.—Poland and Lithuania have agreed to suspend all hostilities, pending an inquiry and decision of the issues at stake by the council of the league of nations, it was announced here.

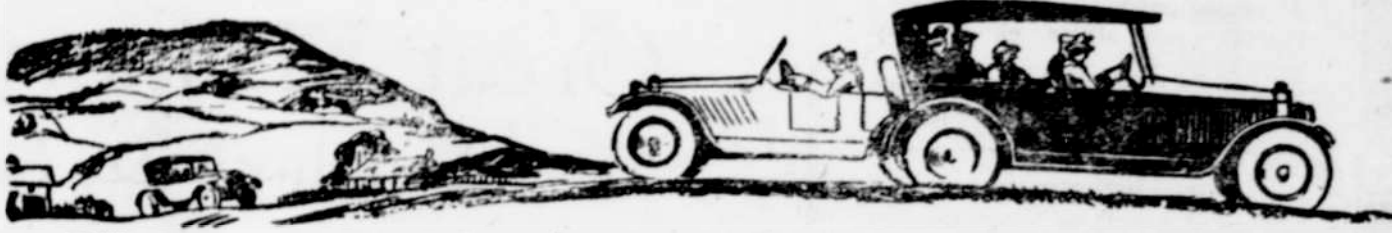
