### Banana Charlotte Russe.

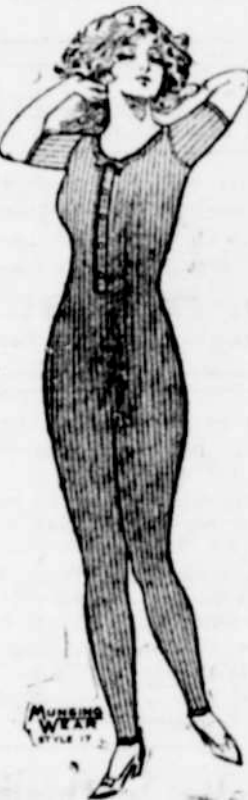

One-half cup corn meal, one cup flour, one cup milk, one tablespoon shortening, half teaspoon salt, two teaspoons baking powder, one dessert spoon sugar, one egg. Mix dry ingredients, add shortening, milk and beaten egg. Beat well and bake 20 minutes. Will make one dozen muffins.
