#### COX GAINS ON HARDING IN REXALL STRAW VOTE

Cox shows a gain over Harding in city, state and nation in the Rexall straw vote.

In Cottage Grove the vote is: Harding—Male votes, 120; female votes, 61; total 181. Cox—Male votes, 74; female votes, 31; total, 105.

In the state the vote is: Harding—Male votes, 3290; female votes, 1340; total, 4632. Cox—Male votes, 1734; female votes, 600; total, 2334.

In the nation the vote is: Harding—Male votes, 135,275; female votes, 47,216; total, 182,491. Cox—Male votes, 91,889; female votes, 25,712; total, 117,601.

On the face of this vote Harding gets 364 electoral votes and Cox 167.

#### Want More Damage.

At least two property owners along the new road known as the S. F. Jackson road, which is intended to cut out a steep hill over the divide in the Lorane section between the Sinslaw and Coyote creek, have filed claims for more damages than the viewers allowed them. H. K. Smith seeks \$1000 damages instead of \$635 as allowed him by the viewers and William Moore claims more than \$295, which was allowed him.

#### Schools Have No Teachers.

There are two school districts in this end of the county which are without teachers, according to a statement made by E. J. Moore, county superintendent. In the entire county 24 schools are without teachers. The two in this section are district No. 20 at Lorane and district No. 131. A high school teacher is also wanted at Lorane.

All advertising signs on the right of way of Pacific highway must come down, according to announcement of State Engineer Nunn. The action was taken on the theory that the highways are public property and that no person has a right to appropriate a part of it to his own use by posting advertising.
