#### TO VACCINATE OR NOT TO VACCINATE.

Eugene, Ore., Oct. 11.—(To the Editor.)—In looking over the pamphlet containing the constitutional amendments and measures to be submitted to the voters of Oregon at the general election, I notice one in particular which affects each citizen of the state, be such citizen a taxpayer or not, very seriously; and it is to this measure I wish to call the attention of the voters of Lane county for the purpose of urging several reasons why they should vote no.

On the face of things, this measure was conceived in ignorance and bigotry and brought forth in an unchristian and unscientific manner, for it violates the golden rule in that it would spread disease wherever its advocates would go, or would please to send their children; and they refuse to acknowledge scientific findings that have been demonstrated by scientific minds to be true beyond doubt. Yet they plead for the constitutional right to spread smallpox, diphtheria, measles and numerous other infectious and contagious diseases when they ask the voters of Oregon to vote yes to this measure, No. 312 and 313.

Those suffering with smallpox or other virulent diseases would be admitted to schools and occupations. All power to control persons affected would be removed, if this measure carries, and we would return to the days when epidemics were the rule. The present public health law is a vast improvement over the old one, but much remains yet to be done towards checking all forms of infectious and contagious diseases. In the minds of the Public School Protective League these are simply "errors;" but any candid person knows that these "errors" are the cause of many deaths in Oregon each year, to say nothing of much suffering, loss of time, and unnecessary expense to the families involved by these "errors." I am anxious to see Oregon forge to the front rank of states engaged in the attempt to control epidemics of disease, and trust that the voters of Lane county will do their full duty by their state, their county and by their families by

voting 313 No on the day of election. The statements made in the argument, as it appears in the pamphlet, are one-sided and not in accord with the facts. To cite my own case to prove this statement: I was vaccinated in infancy and had a good "take" as evidenced by the scar on my arm. Was re-vaccinated at 17; had another good "take." Have been re-vaccinated four times between the ages of 17 and 63 with never a "take." These re-vaccinations were and because of exposures to smallpox and I wished to be sure I was protected. The talk about re-vaccination every two months, as set forth in the argument for this measure is the veriest hush. So long as Tom, Dick and Harry are allowed to run around after exposure to smallpox without the protection afforded by vaccination, so long will Oregon be due to have such experiences as Portland had recently. Vaccination is represented by such people as the Public School Protective League to be something worse than smallpox and something very dangerous to the individual who submits to it. These statements are due to ignorance, or something worse than ignorance—falsehood; or, they are based on cases of careless operating on the part of some physician whose technique is antiquated; or to lack of care on the part of the person vaccinated, in giving proper attention to the arm in which the vaccine is introduced. Present day vaccine carries with it no danger and present day methods of vaccination obviate any serious consequences which opponents of vaccination ever are common in the vaccinated. The discomfort of vaccination is as nothing compared to an average case of smallpox. Hence, give support to the public health law and its officials in their efforts to strangle epidemics of smallpox and other infectious diseases by voting no to this measure which, if it carries, is designed to, and will, make Oregon the laughing stock of the nation and will deter immigration to our state more than all the freak legislation that has ever been put on our statute books. Again I say vote 313 no and help avert a calamity. Yours for a healthy Oregon,

## Oregon Must Have a Port Equal to Any Port on the Pacific Coast

Initiative measure No. 310 on the ballot gives to the Port of Portland means to create such a port.
