**SHERIFF AS CONSTABLE
CAN'T KEEP THE FEES**

Eugene, Ore., Oct. 12.—On demand of District Attorney L. L. Ray, Sheriff Fred G. Stieckles of Lane county has turned over to the county treasurer \$698 which he has collected in justice fees during the last two years he has been in office. The incident brings to light that the Eugene justice court district, comprising 37 precincts of Lane county and presided over by Justice of the Peace Jesse G. Wells, has a constable in name only.

Colonel J. J. Harbaugh, who has been constable of this district for the last eight years, has refused to serve more justice court papers and the district attorney has ruled that the sheriff cannot draw fees for doing so.

When Sheriff Stieckles took office the constable was collecting \$100 a month out of justice court fees, according to records. Last December the amount received by the constable had dropped to \$19 and at that time Constable Harbaugh gave notice, that he would no longer serve papers, alleging that the sheriff had taken the profit out of the business.

**OWNER OF CAR, NOT
DRIVER, RESPONSIBLE**

An important point of law, of interest especially to motorists, was passed upon by Judge G. F. Skipworth, of the Lane county circuit court, Monday. The judge decided that although a motor car owner's wife or child may be driving the car, the owner is liable for damages in case of a collision with another car or with a person, when it is proved that the driver is at fault.

This ruling was made in the case of Homer Bringle against M. Bouchard, in which Bringle sought to recover \$95 damages from Bouchard. Bringle's and Bouchard's cars collided on a Eugene street July 6 of this year, the latter being driven at the time by Bouchard's wife. Bringle's car was pretty badly damaged and he sought redress in court, alleging that Mrs. Bouchard was to blame, but the jury found in her favor.

Homecoming at U. of O.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 25.—(Special).—Nothing is going to be spared by the committees on homecoming this year to make the alumni, former students and friends of the university feel at home when they come back to Oregon for homecoming on November 12 and 13. The committees are making more elaborate plans and are spending more money than ever before.
