### WIZARD OF MAGIC COMING HERE

Davis, the Great Magician, Presents a Most Elaborate Entertainment.

Davis, popularly known as the Master Magician, is to unloose his bag of tricks before local people here on the evening of Saturday, October 30, at the high school auditorium. Davis is the exception disproving the rule that there is nothing new in magic. There is more new stuff in the Davis program than the usual whole evening given by the ordinary magician. What Davis does is wizardry, and his manner of doing it is an artistry of the highest type.

### BEATING TRAIN TO CROSSING SAVES ONLY FEW SECONDS

A. J. McKay, a Southern Pacific locomotive engineer, discussing motorists who race with his train for a common crossing, is puzzled to know what all the hurry is about. He says:

"If auto drivers realized how little time they save if they succeed in crossing in front of an approaching train they might be more content to wait until the train got by and thus guarantee their own safety."

"A local passenger train, consisting of an engine and four or five coaches, traveling at 45 miles an hour will make 66 feet a second and will be only five or six seconds in going over the crossing and a little less than that if making the limit of 50 miles an hour. The heavier overland train, with the cars averaging a little longer than in local service, will generally pass over a road crossing at the rate of one a second. If the auto driver stops at the track while the train is still a quarter of a mile away, he will only have to wait 20 seconds for the train to get to the crossing and then a few seconds more for the train to get by."

"Most of the accidents at highway crossings are those in which the auto gets mixed up with high speed trains. Freight trains of 30 cars or less, frequently travel at the rate of 30 miles an hour and at that rate of speed the shorter cars will be going over the crossing at the rate of one a second; longer freight trains at slower speed will use more time, but even then the delay is insignificant."

### Coral Eggs.

One cup stewed tomatoes, three eggs, half teaspoonful salt, one teaspoon sugar, a dash of pepper, one teaspoon parsley, one teaspoon grated onion. Put the stewed tomato in a small sauce pan over fire, add seasoning. Beat eggs until well mixed, pour them into the hot tomatoes, stir until the eggs are set or firm and serve on four rounds of toasted bread.

### Imitation Whipped Cream.

When you do not have the real thing try the following imitation whipped cream: Beat the whites of two eggs very stiff and dry and add four table-spoons sifted powdered sugar, a very few grains salt, one-third cup of thin cream or milk and a few drops of vanilla. Beat hard and set on ice for an hour before using.
