

LUMBER FOR NEW HOUSE IS FLOATED MILES ON SEA

When H. P. Larsen, a rancher of Heeeta, on the coast in the western end of Lane county, decided to erect a new residence on his place this fall he was in a quandary as to how to transport the lumber from the nearest sawmill to his ranch, the rains having rendered the dirt roads in the mountains in that section of the county impassable for heavy loads.

He finally decided upon a plan whereby he could get his lumber on the ground quite cheaply, although he realized that he ran a good chance of losing all of it. He evolved a scheme of building a raft of the lumber, floating it from Waldport, 25 miles north of the ranch, to a point opposite the place and when the tide was right to loosen the fastenings of the raft and allow the tide to carry the lumber ashore. He engaged two men of Acme with a gasoline launch, they made the trip to Waldport, the raft was built and everything was in readiness for the trip back when a storm came up. The sea did not calm sufficiently to make the return trip for three weeks, but finally better weather came and the raft was set afloat.

The trip was made without incident and when the raft reached the proper point the lumber was loosened and the tide carried every stick of it to shore, landing it high and dry, and Mr. Larsen and his neighbors gathered

it up and had it out of the way of the next tide. He is now at work upon his new residence.

LAND PATENT ISSUED BEFORE CITY OF SALEM WAS KNOWN

A document of unusual interest is in the possession of Mrs. Frances E. Gray. It is the original patent issued to her husband for 320 acres of land taken up in 1852. The patent is numbered 511, was issued through the land office at Oregon City to Caleb Gray and Jane T. Gray, Mr. Gray's first wife, is dated December 18, 1865, and bears the signature of Andrew Johnson, then president of the United States. The land is situated in Linn county 3 1/2 miles west of Halsey. Mr. Gray died in 1909 but the title has never been transferred.

The family residence, a large house built in 1872 but which remained in excellent condition, was burned in September of this year, and a new house will be completed soon. At the time this claim was taken up Oregon City was the principal city of the state and on the present site of Salem there was a lone log house.

Another of Mrs. Gray's cherished possessions is a 2 1/2-dollar gold piece coined in 1853, nearly 65 years ago.

Peach Salad.

Cut peeled peaches in slices and marinate in French dressing made with lemon juice instead of vinegar. When ready to make the salad, drain the fruit and add for three peaches half a dozen chopped peeled radishes, one tablespoon of chopped nut meats, half a cup of shredded lettuce and two slices of chopped canned pineapple. Moisten with a boiled honey dressing and serve in lettuce cups, topping each portion with a maraschino cherry.

Ginger Pear.

Peel, core and cut in eighths eight pounds of pears. Melt six pounds sugar in one pint water and add one-eighth pound white ginger root enclosed in small muslin bag and the peel of three lemons cut in fine strips. Cook the pears slowly in this syrup for two to four hours according to the firmness of the pears, and then add the juice of the three lemons.

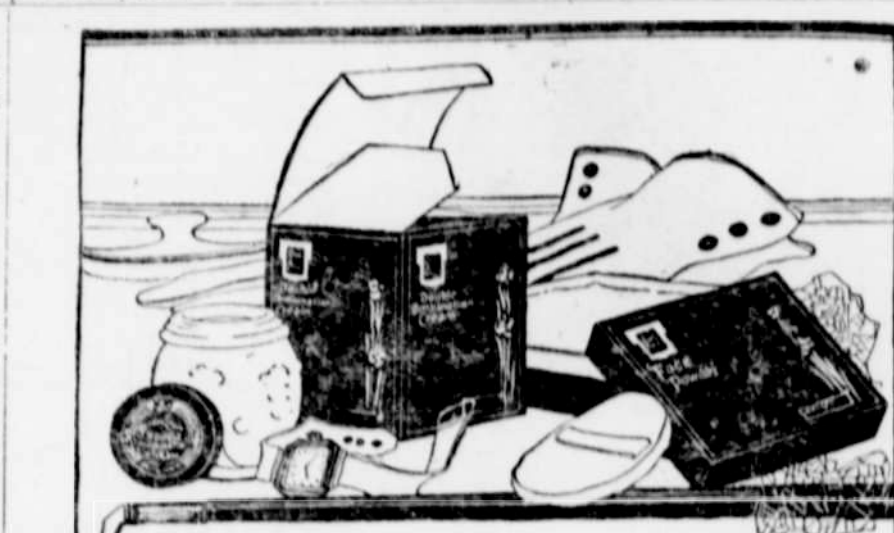

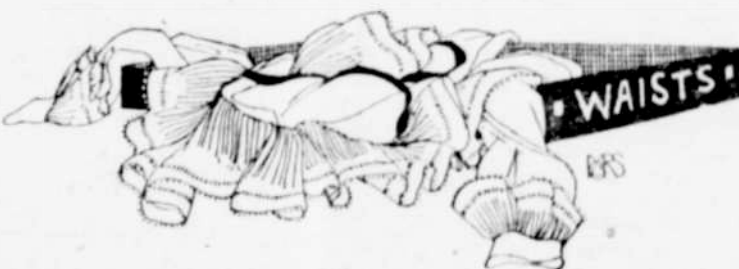
