VICTORY MEDALS AND BUTTONS FOR NAVY EX-SERVICE MEN

A navy victory medal and button will be awarded to each person who performed active duty in the navy during the world war between the dates of April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, and whose service was honorable. An ex-service enlisted man may obtain his victory medal from any navy recruiting station by presenting or sending his discharge or original release from active duty and his war service certificate must be sent in order that the clasp he is entitled to may be determined. Members of the naval reserve force may obtain their medals in the same manner. Ex-service officers may obtain their medals upon application direct to the bureau of navigation.

The navy recruiting station at 322 State street, Salem, will furnish additional information on request and assist in the distribution of the victory medals, clasps and buttons.
