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HEALTH CENTERS AID ALL COMMUNITY LIFE

Home Service Work Broadens to Include Civilian Families.

An integral part of the great health program of the American Red Cross, undertaken after the suspension of many of the war activities of the organization, is the establishment of Health Centers—which now are being installed in many communities throughout the northwest. It is a movement of compelling interest to the citizens of this part of the country.

The health center as organized by the Red Cross is proving the greatest preventive medicine known, as well as protection of great value in times of widespread illness or epidemic. From health centers radiate all kinds of helpful influences from the giving of proper advice and the furnishing of competent nursing, medical and surgical aid, to the inauguration of many forms of beneficial exercises such as community singing, athletics and outdoor games. From health centers go the visiting nurses. There are held the teaching classes for home nursing, children's clinics and proper welfare work.

The Red Cross says that no longer shall curable physical deformities curse the lives of our children. It believes the time is past when tuberculosis should be allowed without hindrance to fasten itself upon the tender bodies of our little ones. It

believes that through health centers established in every considerable community throughout the United States, health can be safeguarded and therefrom greater happiness be brought to our people.

Ignorance of diseases, ignorance as to what are the best means to pursue in combating them, ignorance as to the standing and competency of certain medical men—these today are responsible for a vast number of deaths in the world. Quacks prey upon our people with their glaring and lying advertisements and in hundreds of thousands of cases individuals absolutely deceived by their pretensions pass beyond the days when their infirmities might be cured. For these perils the Red Cross health center forms a safeguard.

The health centers being established become the people's clubs, with memberships designed to reach vast numbers of the population since membership costs but \$1 a year—the annual Red Cross dues.

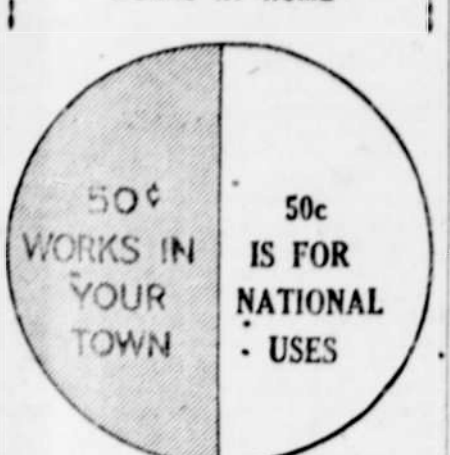
Another phase of the peace-time program of the organization which rapidly is becoming of paramount value in the northwest is comprised in the Home Service activities. Designed originally for the benefit solely of disabled service men and their families, it has grown to occupy a far broader field. Red Cross welfare workers look to the interests of former soldiers and sailors in hospitals and schools; maintain personal contact with the disabled who are at home. Home Service forms the connecting link between the disabled man in hospital or school and his family.

But Home Service has grown beyond this. In nearly 40 of the 106 chapters of the Northwestern Division experienced social workers are employed, and the service is being extended to civilian families. In some chapters information stations for the benefit of the general public have been established. In Raymond, Washington, the Home Service department maintains an office close to the railway stations and visitors where any day may be seen the hotel inquiring for the residence of a friend, or the genial traveling man asking the location of the business house upon which he wants to call.

Social Service extends down through the chapters to the branches and auxiliaries. Several Northwestern chapters have branches which maintain local Home Service operatives, their activities being financed through small revolving funds from the chapter treasuries.

Fifty cents of every dollar of membership fees stays in the community in which it has been contributed. It is that fifty cents which aids in this important Home Service development.

MANAGEMENT COSTS LOW FOR RED CROSS

National and Division Headquarters Take Less Than 4 Per Cent of Funds.

Red Cross Roll Call—the fourth annual re-enlistment of members in the American organization—will be held here November 11 to 25. Officers in charge of the Roll Call for the chapter of which this city forms a part, however, feel that the canvass in this section practically can be completed within the first week of the time set should the present plans for intensive work be followed out.

In all its work preparatory to the Roll Call the Red Cross this year, as last, has laid stress on the point that the movement is purely a dues-gathering activity, and not to be confused with "drives" or other campaigns. The national body also is laying emphasis on the fact that more than 50 per cent of all membership fees secured here remain in this community, and on the low "overhead" cost of the organization.

"While the Red Cross has not been subjected to that violent criticism of extravagance and waste which has been attached to some activities resulting from the war and its after-effects," said an officer of the national body recently, "we are pleased to be able to make public the fact that management cost at national headquarters and in the 14 divisions has amounted to less than 4 per cent of the total expenditures by the organization. This is a turnover expense so small as to establish a mark for many a commercial concern to work toward, and on its face proves that for the Red Cross, organization efficiency and economy are not only ideals but achievements."

JUNIOR RED CROSS HELPS IN COMMUNITY'S WORK

Through the Junior Red Cross the school children of this county have an important part in work of the local Red Cross chapter. Throughout the Northwest school children are taking a keen interest in the activities in which they are engaging as members of this organization. These activities do not interfere in any way with the regular work of the schools, but they do add zest to class room studies.

In Portland, Tacoma, and Spokane the Juniors have financed clinics, where children have been given dental and medical examinations. In numerous counties throughout Idaho, Oregon and Washington they have made provisions for first aid kits in every rural school. Besides other activities, the Juniors of Boise, Idaho, are providing flowers for the Barracks Hospital in that city where many disabled ex-service men are receiving treatment. Poor, crippled children in many towns have received badly needed attention, and the bills have been paid out of funds raised by the Junior Red Cross.

Through the Junior Red Cross thousands of children in Europe have been fed and given medical care through contributions by members of the Junior Red Cross in this country. The Juniors of the Northwest gathered large quantities of clothing for the "Wild Children of the Urals," who were recently returned to their homes by the American Red Cross after having wandered uncared for over the wastes of Siberia. And now, through the Junior Red Cross, it is being made possible for children in this country to correspond with children in other lands.

One Month of Red Cross Work.

In an average month this year, the Red Cross aided 423,888 adults and 101,755 children in Europe; people who otherwise would be without even the simple necessities of life.

Protection for Future Years.

Last year 92,000 women and girls, under Red Cross instructions, completed courses in home care of the sick.

Adjutant-General White has issued a proclamation calling upon all National Guard units in Oregon to assist in the appropriate observance of Armistice day, Nov. 11.

With the exception of 1400 feet between Hovey station and Warren, and pavement on the lower Columbia highway is completed between Portland and Tide Creek.

The Oregon Growers' Cooperative association announces that it has enough prune orders on hand to keep its plants in operation at full capacity until the latter part of November.

Calls for bids on two-inch bituminous surfacing for the business streets of Bend have been issued by the city council. Contracts will be awarded at a special council meeting November 9.

H. E. Haefner, forest examiner in the Siskiyou national forest, is cruising a tract of timber near Powers with a view to the sale of about 20,000,000 feet to the Coos Bay lumber company.

The assessment roll of Columbia county, as completed by Assessor Blakesley, shows that the total assessed valuation, exclusive of public service corporation property, is \$12,627,275.

The annual conference of the Pacific district of the United Danish Lutheran church adjourned at Eugene after a four days' session at which delegates from California and Oregon were in attendance.

Nineteen carloads of wheat were received at the Astoria port terminals Monday, making a grand total of 576 carloads, or 776,173 bushels of wheat, which have arrived there since the season opened.

Corla L. Drahelm, of 4716 Eighty-second street, Portland, 17 years old, was awarded a bronze medal by the Carnegie hero commission for saving Gordon M. Law, a baby, from being killed by an automobile on July 12, 1917.

The old Methodist church building at the corner of Tenth avenue and Willamette street, one of the landmarks of Eugene, has been sold by the Southern Pacific company to a building and loan association, and it will soon be razed.

Little if any time can be had by the farmers from the state lime plant at Gold Hill, according to A. B. Cordley, dean of agriculture at the Oregon agricultural college, who says the state lime board will be practically unable to operate the plant this fall unless it has legislative assistance.

Frank Lovell, state tax commissioner, has called a meeting of all county assessors and representatives of the various railroads operating in Oregon to be held in Salem November 10. The purpose of the conference is to discuss and agree upon the proportion of taxes that should be paid by these corporations.

Thirteen indictments were returned by the grand jury at Medford as a result of the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville. Myrtle Blakely, county treasurer, R. D. Hines, half brother of W. H. Johnson and vice-president of the defunct institution, and W. H. Johnson, president and cashier of the bank, were indicted.

"Better Bucks, Bulls and Boars Build Bigger Bank Balances" is the slogan adopted by the First National bank of Bend in the livestock improvement program initiated by that institution in the Bend district. As an initial step in the program, the bank brought 75 ewes and an \$800 ram to central Oregon last spring.

Erection of a pulp mill to be operated in connection with the lumber plants of the Silver Falls Timber company at Silverton was announced by the management of the latter concern. By-products of the sawmills of the Silverton company will be ground at the pulp plant and shipped to the various paper mills of the Pacific northwest to be converted into the finished product.

Oregon mines produced ore in 1919 of a total value of \$1,514,253, according to a report made by the geological survey. Gold was produced to a value of \$977,845; silver, 111,121 ounces, and copper, 2,214,815 pounds. Baker led the counties, producing about 96 per cent of the state's total mineral output. Other producing counties are Clackamas; Curry, Douglas, Grant, Josephine, Malheur and Wheeler.

While the first three weeks of harvest were characterized by unprecedented rains, the apple picking season in Hood River has closed in a burst of glory. The last week was ideal for harvest, and growers have been enabled to get their fruit under cover without difficulty. The Apple Growers' association already has received in excess of 450,000 boxes of fruit, and more than 200,000 boxes have been delivered to other shipping concerns.

In line with a movement for a larger capacity power and electric plant at Bandon, with a dam on Willow creek, in Curry county, and a transmission line of 20-odd miles to Bandon, the Bandon Power company submitted to the city council a price of \$35,000 for its plant, including buildings, distribution system and all machinery. Engineers had estimated the probable cost of the new system at \$105,000, including the Bandon Power company's holdings at a price of \$25,000.
