RISE IN RATES IS DENIED TO LIGHT COMPANY

Findings Based Upon Lack of Information and Lack of Showing Made by Utility.

The application of the Cottage Grove Electric company for a rise in rates has been denied by the public service commission. The statement of the commission is a lengthy one and indicates that the rise in rates was denied because the lighting company made a poor showing as to the value of improvements and kept records in such shape that it was impossible to determine from them whether or not the company was operating at a loss or a profit.

The statement says in part: "Mr. Shinn seemed very reticent about answering questions directly or indirectly or in any way giving information as to the circumstances. As far as accurate accounting is concerned there was apparently no effort to comply with the rules and regulations of the commission, and the officers were not only derelict in their duty but in fact assumed a defiant, arbitrary and indifferent attitude, as shown by the attitude of Mr. Shinn."

Quotations are made from the record of the proceedings in which many questions are answered in a manner which the commission thinks bears out the above statement.

The officials of the electric company naturally are not satisfied with the findings of the commission and they do not think it is based upon the testimony submitted. Mr. Shinn makes the statement that a new application for a rise in rates will be immediately filed and that unless an increase is granted the utility must cease to operate. He thinks that the record kept during the present year will be found satisfactory to the commission upon which to act in fixing rates.

That the petition was denied largely because of lack of information upon which to work and that an order for increased rates is likely to follow a better showing is indicated by the following paragraph from the commission's statement:

"The whole record is pregnant with evasion and attempt to conceal that which is most important to the commission and to patrons in attempting to arrive at a proper solution. Where the record is void of any semblance or attempt even to approximate the revenues then it is entirely barren of anything upon which to base an order fixing rates. A reasonable time over which an accurate account of the income and disbursements on which to predicate an order would be a year, and until the figures are available covering approximately such period there is no possible way even under the most extraordinary circumstances to fix fair and equitable rates."

Many Still Support Red Cross.

Despite the fact that weather conditions, sickness and lack of soliters have caused the annual Red Cross roll call to drag, the results have been quite encouraging, according to Mrs. Lucile Dyott, Cottage Grove chairman. The number of memberships received to date is over 350. The soliters find the hardest part of their work to explain that Red Cross work is nearly as important now as during the war and that many thousands of soldiers are still being assisted and nursed by the Red Cross. Of course, the other mercy work of this organization is tremendous.

Marine Victory Medals Ready.

The district of Oregon headquarters, U. S. marine corps, has received the Victory medals for distribution among all ex-marines in the state.

All that is necessary to secure this beautiful emblem of victory which every man who served with the marines during the war is entitled to, is to send discharge certificate by registered mail to the U. S. marine recruiting station, Third and Alder Sts., Portland.

The discharge will be immediately returned to owner, accompanied by the medal.

Home From Montana.

Albert Anderson arrived Monday from Montana, where he and his brother Ernest spent several years. The latter is sticking on the job. He had a fine crop coming on for this year but hail got it. The farmers there have made no money for several years. Mrs. Anderson arrived with Mr. Anderson and they may remain here some time. Road Districts Vote Taxes.

At the road district meetings held Saturday, No. 69, the Silk Creek district, voted a tax of 10 mills, the vote being 32 to 28. A number of the taxpayers wished to reduce the amount to 5 mills, otherwise the residents were practically unanimous for a tax. Other districts reported as having voted taxes are No. 57, at Lorane, a 10 mill tax; No. 15, Coast Fork, 5 mills; No. 76, Mosby Creek, 2 mills.

Feeding for Eggs Demonstrated.

A demonstration of the winter plan of feeding for egg production was held Tuesday afternoon at the T. C. Shaw ranch east of the city, the demonstration being made by H. E. Bosby, an expert from O. A. C. About 25 poultry raisers of this section were present, as well as Ira P. Whitney, county agent.

OVERHEAD CROSSING IS UNDERGOING REPAIRS

Repairs are being made to the overhead highway on Pacific highway at Divide. The construction of this crossing over the Southern Pacific tracks was originally an expensive piece of work and during the few months it has been open to traffic the earth under the foundations has moved until one of the supporting pillars has cracked. The earth is being cut back for 20 feet underneath the structure at either approach in the hope of remedying the trouble.

CANNERY PACKS NINE CARS DURING SEASON

The cannery closed down Friday for the season, after having been in operation five months. The total pack was nine cars, of which five already have been disposed of. Everything has been sold except the apples and prunes. The pack last year was 13 cars. The decreased pack this year is due to a shortage in apples, berries and beans. An average of 25 people were employed during the season.

EUGENE VOTES LIMIT FOR CONDUCT OF CITY AFFAIRS

Eugene Register: The city budget for 1921 as adopted by the council in fixing the annual tax levy for Eugene Monday night provides for raising the sum of \$106,176 by taxation, of which \$58,000 will be used to pay interest on bonds and warrants and to provide for the various sinking funds for bond issues.

The amount provided for in the budget will represent a levy of a fraction over 14 mills on the dollar, last year's levy being an even 14 mills. The amounts placed in the various funds are as high as they can place them, owing to the six per cent limit law, except the library and park funds, which were placed a trifle lower than last year because the money taken off them was absolutely needed in other funds.

The large sum that is necessary to be placed aside for interest and sinking funds each year compels the council to get along with far less money than it would take to conduct the various departments upon a basis that would bring them up to the efficiency desired.

PRECIPITATION LITTLE MORE THAN THAT OF LAST YEAR

The record kept by Clint Stewart, local cooperative weather observer, shows that the precipitation for November was not particularly unusual, being but a trifle above that of last year. The report for November is as follows: Mean maximum temperature, 52.03; mean minimum, 36.4; mean, 44.21; maximum, 62; minimum, 24. The precipitation was 7.97 inches. Clear days, 10, partly cloudy, 4, cloudy 16. The report for the same month last year was as follows: Mean maximum temperature, 51; mean minimum, 37; maximum, 68; minimum, 31. Precipitation, 7.57 inches. Clear days, 8; partly cloudy, 10; cloudy, 12.

Booth Kelly Mills Again Operate.

The big Booth-Kelly Lumber company mill, at Wendling, which had been idle for a number of weeks, has resumed operations. The mill at Springfield, which had been idle since the fuel bin of the Mountain States Power company burned November 10, is again running.

"We are now working entirely on old business," states A. C. Dixon, manager of the company, "and there is no new business in sight. Prospects for immediate betterment in the lumber business are not at all bright."

COMES NEAR BEING USED FOR PACKING AROUND MILL SHAFT

George Boyd sustained two fractured fingers of the right hand in an odd accident Wednesday and considers himself lucky to have a whole body to have the fingers attached to. He was driving underneath the docks at the Western Lumber & Export company's mill and swung the lines over his head to slap his team. The lines became entangled with an open shaft and within a few seconds the right hand was wrapped to the shaft. Only exertion of every muscle saved his entire body from being drawn around the shaft and the fact that he was able to get his team to back up and give a little slack to the reins enabled him to extricate his hand. There were no injuries except to the hand.

Friday night was a busy one for burglars and sneak thieves. They broke the lock on S. R. Brand's chicken house and appropriated several fine fryers. From there they evidently went to L. R. Long's chicken house, where the lock was broken. There were no chickens at home, but a half sack of apples and a half sack of potatoes were taken and three of the chickens taken from the Brand chicken house were left there. The same night Fay Allison's house was entered and Mrs. Allison's trousers removed to the rear porch, where they were rifled of their contents, amounting to \$39. Evidently these were the same parties who got the chickens and they merely took Fay's chicken feed.

Five burglaries were reported in Eugene at about the same time as those here, three occurring on Saturday night.

HARVEYS CELEBRATE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

Mr. and Mrs. I. M. Harvey celebrated their golden wedding anniversary Thanksgiving day, a dinner in their honor being given at the home of their son, Worth Harvey. H. H. Harvey, of Medford, another son, was present. The only daughter, Mrs. Sylvia E. Medley, of Medford, was unable to be here.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Harvey crossed the plains with their parents about 20 years before their marriage Nov. 20, 1870, at Santa Rosa, Calif. They have never returned to the east since their arrival on the coast. They moved to Medford, Ore., in 1880 and to Cottage Grove in 1907.

PARKING LIMIT IN EUGENE 30 MINUTES

Eugene Register: Chief of Police Christensen has instructed the new traffic officer to enforce the ordinance prohibiting the parking of cars on Willamette street between Fifth and Eleventh avenues and on Ninth avenue between Willamette and Oak streets for a longer period than half an hour. These streets are too badly crowded to permit of cars standing any length of time.

COUNTY HAS OVER \$35,000 LEFT IN MARKET ROAD FUND

The sum of \$35,769 was left in Lane county's market road fund this year to be applied to next year's fund. While the sums set aside for some of the projects were overdrawn during the year, practically nothing was drawn from the sum set aside for the Blachly road which is designated as the Eugene-Florence road and over which there has been so much controversy between members of the state highway commission.

The report of the engineer on this fund follows:

Eugene-Lorane road: budgeted, \$20,000; expended, \$29,397.97.

Cottage Grove-Lorane road: budgeted, \$9000; expended, \$15,348.31.

Upper Willamette river road: budgeted, \$9000; expended, \$1710.10.

Blachly road: budgeted, \$32,000; expended, \$11.25.

Mohawk road: nothing budgeted; expended, \$7802.44.

Blachly road, west of summit: nothing budgeted; expended, \$809.89.

The total amount expended on market roads during the year was \$55,169.89.

Work on the Blachly road contract will soon begin, according to county road officials. Hall & Washburne, who have the contract, are now preparing to start clearing the right of way and will begin the grading as early in the spring as possible.

HAS 81 GREAT GRANDCHILDREN BUT ONLY 41 GRAND-CHILDREN

It is an unusual incident to find more great grandchildren than grandchildren, but such is the case with Grandma M. C. Willis. She has 61 great grandchildren and only 41 grandchildren. Seven of 11 children are living. Mrs. Willis is in her ninety-fifth year, is yet quite spry and is yet able to do her own reading. Her oldest child is 72.

\$25,000 WORTH OF CATTLE ARE Brought INTO COUNTY

Twenty-five thousand dollars worth of pure bred cattle were purchased at the Pacific International Livestock exposition in Portland by Lane county farmers. These cattle will go far toward strengthening the various herds to which they will be attached and will help to bring Lane county up to the standard set by other counties in the state.

ITEM FOR LORANE ROAD IS CUT DOWN HALF

Court Would Put \$10,000 Into This Project; Budget Committee Cuts It to \$5,000.

Items of \$10,000 for the Cottage Grove-Lorane road and \$12,000 for the Eugene-Lorane road, put into the annual budget by the county court, were cut in two at the taxpayers' budget meeting held Monday. The motion to make the cut was made by E. J. Adams.

The appropriation for the salary of a county roadmaster was first passed without comment but was later brought up by C. P. Barnard, county judge-elect, and a spirited debate followed. E. M. Sharp, county commissioner-elect is reported as having made a dramatic appeal for the elimination of this item, promising that without a superintendent he would show results out of all proportion to those of the past. The budget was adopted as presented by the county court, with the exception of items for roads and bridges, in which several changes were made.

Rev. J. F. Smith Is Buried Here.

The funeral of Rev. J. F. Smith, who died in Marshfield, was held here Monday afternoon from Mills chapel, Rev. Dollahide, of Roseburg, officiating. Pneumonia was the cause of death and Rev. Smith was sick but a few days. He was born in Kansas January 3, 1878, and came to Oregon when 12 years of age. He was a resident in Cottage Grove a few years, occupying the pulpit at the Free Methodist church. Surviving relatives are his wife, who is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Wick; four small children; the mother, Mrs. Emma Smith, of Portland; a sister, Mrs. W. H. Walling, of Portland, all of whom were present for the funeral, and several brothers and sisters. Rev. Smith had been in the ministry since 1902 and was ordained an elder in 1912.

Run Over by Speeder.

Harry Meunias, employed in the Southern Pacific section gang at Comstock, was brought here Saturday for treatment for injuries sustained when he was run over by a gasoline track speeder. He had been assisting to start the car by pushing it along the track. As he jumped onto the front end of the car it gave a jerk and threw him under the wheels. One of them ran almost the entire length of his body, the car coming to stand still with the wheel on his chest. It is thought that his injuries were not serious. He is now in the Southern Pacific hospital at San Francisco.

Taylor Is Released.

Burrell Taylor, who was arrested four weeks ago on a charge of taking a mortgaged automobile belonging to Woodson Brothers out of the county, and who has been confined in jail, was released Monday without bail on an order from Judge Young, of Cottage Grove.

The order was obtained by habeas corpus on the basis of a decision made by Judge Skipworth that an automobile is classified as a migratory chattel and thus is exempted from the law relating to the transference of mortgaged property. Taylor will appear before the grand jury when that body meets in February.

Eugene Has Speed Cop.

Eugene Register: Traffic law violators will now be watched more closely than ever in this city, according to Police Judge Alta King. He announced Monday that the police motorcycle, manned by a special officer, will be placed on the streets at once and all drivers caught exceeding the speed limit or breaking the laws in other ways will be speedily brought to justice.

The police department is spurred to employ drastic measures by the numerous automobile accidents on the streets lately.

Lad Severely Injured in Play.

Harold Bede, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Bede, sustained a severe injury in play at school Tuesday forenoon. In a volley ball game he was pushed in the way of one of the swings which was being used and he was struck on the right side of the head by the board of the swing. A severe gash and wound were inflicted and he was partially unconscious for some time. He was able to return to school the next day.

Maglady Makes Rep. Votes.

"Those Who Come and Go," in the Oregonian: To have Thanksgiving dinner with his family, Jack Maglady, the lumberman of Row River, was in Portland yesterday.
