It appearing from the abstract of votes cast at the regular November 2nd, 1920, election, as made by the canvassing board of Lane county, Oregon, consisting of R. S. Bryson, County Clerk, A. Hemenway, Justice of the Peace in and for Goshen Precinct, in Lane County, Oregon, and W. J. Holland, Justice of the Peace in and for Coyote Precinct, in Lane County, Oregon, that at the said election the total number of votes cast in the precinct of Silk Creek, in Lane County, Oregon, on the question "For and against stock running at large," is and was 62 votes, and of said votes 27 votes were cast for stock running at large and 35 votes were cast against stock running at large and it appearing from said abstract that there is and was a majority of 18 votes against stock running at large in said precinct.

Therefore in compliance with Section

5575 of the General Laws of Oregon as amended by Section 1 Chapter 150 of the Laws of 1911 notice is hereby given that after sixty days from the date of this notice it shall be unlawful for stock to run at large, under penalty of ten (10) dollars for the first offense, and twenty (20) dollars for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the stock in a civil action in the name of the State of Oregon before a justice of the peace in the district in which such owner or keeper or either of them may reside, and if there be no justice of the peace in such district, then before any justice of the peace in the county, and it shall be the duty of each constable in any justice of the peace district, and of each road supervisor in any road district to enforce the provisions of this section; and such penalty shall be for the benefit of, and when collected, paid into the common school fund of the county in which such action is brought, within sixty (60) days after
